THE LATE MINOAN IIIB:1 SETTLEMENT

STRATIGRAPHY AND CATALOGUES

BUILDING 1

One part of the building seems to have been relatively undisturbed since the LM IIIB:1 destruction, namely the area covering Rooms A-D (*Fig. 1*) and part of the southern corridor. It is mostly found right below sealed LM IIIB:2 floors and consists of three main layers: a thick heavy deposit on top, with many stones below, within which is found a layer with apparently less stones and at the bottom are the floor deposits. At places (mainly close to walls) the top layer was not noted and at others the intermediate layer was not noted.

LATE PIT IN ROOM D (Fig. 3, Pl. 26a, 33d)

The pit appears to have been sealed below the LM IIIB:2 surface, but during excavation it was seen to cut through both the stone layer and the floor of Room D, for which reason it must belong to the latest activities in this area. The pit was excavated at levels from 9.64 down to 8.86. It contained soft reddish-grey soil without many sherds and many bones were found towards the bottom. The pottery was mainly LM IIIB with some LM IIIA and LM I sherds. 4.700 kg of pottery were collected: 13% decorated, 49% kept and 0% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.


BONES

Bones of both adult and young *Ovis*, caprid and *Sus*, as well as young *Bos*.

Comments: Many of the bones were found towards bottom, which contained darker soil.




Fig. 4. LM IIIB:1 Rooms A, B, C and D, plan of layer with stones and distribution of finds. Reduced 75% of original in 1:50.




Fig. 5a-b. Rooms A, C and D, sections A-A and B-B; cf. Fig. 4. Reduced 75% of original in 1:50.

LAYER WITH STONES (*Figs. 4, 5a-b, Pls. 15a:4, 5, 16a:5, 16b:4 and 4a, 16c:34, 26a-c*)

This layer is situated in the southwestern part of the excavation below the LM IIIB:2 open Space A-D, where in large parts a clear surface was recognized meaning that the layer below was clearly sealed (Cf. *GSE* II, 101-103 and III, 125-127). The area is lying within 508-519/699-708 and it covers



by and large the Rooms A, B, C, D and the southern part of the corridor. It was excavated over the years 1977 to 1987. It constitutes the top layer of this part of Building 1 and in general it is a layer going across the existing walls; the exception being most of the western wall of Room C, 14-Wall 3a, which is preserved to a fair hight. The layer was roughly 0.40 thick and was excavated at levels from c. 10.11-9.85 down to c. 9.55-9.65 (*Fig. 5a-b*). The important characteristic of the layer is the presence of many stones apparently from the collapsed walls. Where noted, the stones had diameters varying from c. 0.20-40 – sizes corresponding to the stones actually seen in the preserved parts of the walls. In several cases slab stones were also noted – but these are quite often used as reused building stones in late walls and do not need to imply slabbed upper floors as is the case in the LM I buildings.

The soil between the stones appeared to vary slightly in the different areas. The colours of the soil varied from light brown, yellowish-brown to red-brownish. At several places pieces of charcoal and spots with plaster and a few pieces of burnt clay were noted. Also noted among the fallen stones were some slab stones (probably reused). In all baskets pieces of LM IIIB were noted and in most were also some pieces of LM IIIA and a few LM I. Furthermore in very few cases EM and MM were noted. Two intrusive sherds from the

Comments: The find assemblage is not surprisingly different from the average. There are a few traces of textile industry, a few stone tools, a single bead/button/spindle whorl, two fragments of figurines, a single stone vase fragment and a single fragment from a mould. How many of these finds can be directly connected to the building is uncertain.

What is more interesting is the only piece of metal – an arrowhead (80-M 012) – found in the position 509.25/701.35/9.56 which is exactly 0.10 above the level of the threshold between Rooms A and B at the position where one would have expected to find the wooden framework of the door – might an arrow have been shut into the door? The second find of interest consists of pieces of wall plaster in connection with Room D – pieces which were also found lower down in the room indicating that the walls or part of the walls in this room had been plastered.

Most of the joins in this level are "natural", i.e they were found in the immediately overlying, underlying or neighbouring deposits. Especially remarkable are the many joins to the floor deposit of Room C strengthening the hypothesis that most of the pottery stored in Room C was originally placed on shelves on the southern part of 14-Wall 3a, so that those standing high on shelves were also found high up in the collapsed building. This probably means that most of the sherds in Room C had actually belonged to complete vases kept in the room. Nothing similar was noted in the other rooms.

Of the joins which were not "natural", three observations can be made: 1) in five instances joining sherds were collected in later (mainly LM IIIB:2) pits scattered all over the excavation, in positions whereto they could not have come by erosion (natural sloping of site is wrong). Is it perhaps due to levelling works in connection with the LM IIIB:2 building activity? 2) on two occasions joins came from other LM IIIB:1 deposits. The one to the eastern part of the corridor may be natural, while the ones to 19-Pit Q in the Courtyard must be caused by human activity – a casual scatter while both areas functioned? and 3) some joins to large LM IIIA:1 pits in the southeastern corner. In this case the sherds of the LM IIIB:1 building was probably part of the construction material in walls and roofs.

A surprisingly high percentage of decorated pottery was found (27%) and much was pottery kept – especially from the seasons 1980 and 1982-83. The high number of pithoi is because most sherds were inventoried. Perhaps a surprisingly small amount of burnt pottery was found when we know that the building was destroyed by fire; and several of the burnt sherds came from tripods. Seven plaster fragments, however, had spots of black from burning.

A surprisingly low percentage of earlier sherds are inventoried, at least of LM I and MM. Much of the material in this layer may have come from the constructions and a high percentage of LM IIIA (at least compared to floor deposit) would not be surprising. Layer with stones contained 19.1% earlier pieces and the floor deposits in Rooms A-D 10.4% earlier pieces, cf. below, p. 446.

The large amount of stones in this area indicates that the walls – in contrast to earlier buildings – had been built entirely of stone, mainly unworked middle-sized stones and to a certain extent reused stones and slab stones. This may perhaps also account for the relatively few traces of burning/ charcoal in the excavated area – wood being less frequently used than earlier. Note though the large piece of carbonized wood (80-MISC 020). No terracotta fragments were recorded to indicate anything about roof constructions.




Fig. 6. LM IIIB:1 Room A, plan of stone circle and cover slabs.

ROOM A (Figs. 6-11, Pls. 27-31c)

Room A is situated in the southwestern part of Building 1 within the squares 508.5-513/699-702 (*Fig. 1*). Only a small part of the room is excavated/preserved since it continues be-




Fig. 7a. Room A, section A-A; cf. *Figs.* 6, 8, 9 and 11.




Fig. 7b. Room A, section B-B; cf. *Figs. 6, 8, 9* and *11*.

low the modern streets and since it is in the central part cut by the large Venetian wall foundation and foundation pit of W1-021 (*GSE* I, 160-163). Two walls are preserved: the northwestern, 17-Wall 3, with a door leading into Room B, and the northeastern, 17-Wall 4. The length of the walls are 4.00 and 2.60, which means that the room had a size of more than 10.5




Fig. 8. LM IIIB:1 Room A, plan of 17-Floor 1, 17-Pit E and distribution of finds.

m². In the north corner of the Room a circular shaft was discovered with a diameter of *c*. 0.80 which was covered by four large slabs and partly surrounded by a stone circle (*Fig. 6, Pl. 29b*). Six layers of floors were noted in the room. Of these only the upper two, 17-Floor 1 and 17-Floor 4 belonged to the room since the lower four floors (cf. p. 199) continued below 17-Wall 4 (*Figs. 7b, 10*). The shaft in the north corner belonged with 17-Floor 4. Like the remaining part of Building 1, Room A was destroyed at the end of the LM IIIB:1 period, but in contrast to the findings in the other rooms, Room A seems to have survived for a very short period before the building collapsed and was covered with the layer with stones.

The walls of Room A have not yet been excavated and are still visible at the site. Both walls were new constructions of the LM IIIB:1 period. 17-Wall 3 (Fig. 6, Pls. 28a, 30) is preserved to a length of 2.60 and with a width of 0.65 and in the northern part to a height of almost one metre. 1.10 from the north corner of the room the wall was broken by a 0.95 wide door opening (Pl. 31c). The southern part of the wall was partly destroyed from the side of Room B. The wall is mainly built of medium sized rubble stones layered with earth mortar in the usual sandwich type. On the walls facing Room A there were no certain indications of plaster being used. The door consisted of one central slab laid on a row of small stones. On each side of the central slab were larger stones which may have supported wooden posts. In connection with this door opening we did not note any arrangement for a pivot hole as was the case with other doors in this building. 17-Wall 4 will be described in connection with Room D (see below pp. 68-69).

Upper floor (*Figs. 5b, 6, 7a-b, 8, Pls. 27a-e, 28a*)

The latest deposits in Room A are stratigraphically situated below the layer with stones and have an average thickness of c. 0.10. They cover all the excavated part of Room A at levels from c. 9.60 down to 17-Floor 1 at 9.50-9.37 and in the area of 17-Pit E down to c. 9.30. 17-Floor 1 was noted to cover most of the area and had a clearly burnt surface in the eastern part. In other parts it may not have been so well defined. In the north corner of the room only a small part of the floor was recognized above a dump excavated as 17-Pit E. Several joins from the above and below deposits were noted [e.g. 80-P 0893, Vase B, cf. Fig. 8]. The surface of the floor was very uneven and in several places the stones from the stone circle were going through the floor and the dump extended below the floor. At the bottom of the dump some large slabs were discovered. The finds seem to indicate that when the shaft in the north corner of Room A ceased to be used after the destruction of Building 1 a dump (17-Pit E) was heaped on top of it and parts were trodden flat to appear like a floor or surface. The soil above the floor was soft reddish-brown with pieces of charcoal, brick and lime, and some concentration of greyish burnt soil. It was hard on top, loose below and contained loose ash and charcoal in some parts, red burnt clay soil in other parts, which were sometimes mixed. "Floor 1" above the dump consisted of relatively hard red and orange clay with charcoal pieces. 17-Pit E contained loose greenishbrown soil with small stones and pieces of charcoal.

All datable baskets contained LM IIIB pottery, further a few pieces of LM IIIA, LM I and MM were noted. 27.045 kg of pottery were collected: 12% decorated, 83% kept and 2.5% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.




Fig. 9. LM IIIB:1 Room A, plan of 17-Floor 4, stone circle, shaft and distribution of finds.



Comments: Floor and pit were stripped of interesting finds which seems a bit strange when compared to the other rooms. Two joins go to the floor of the corridor, one joins to the floor of Room D, one joins to Room B floor, one joins to the stone circle of the shaft, and three joins to the underlying 17-Floor 4. Most may be considered "natural" as a result of the destruction of the building. Much LW and burnt pottery was noted.

Lower floor (Figs. 6, 7a-b, 9, 10, Pls. 28b-d, 29a-d)

At this point it is still uncertain when the shaft was constructed, but it seems to have been in connection with 17-Floor 4 and certainly the shaft was in use in connection with this floor. 17-Floor 4 mostly lies on the level 9.33 to 9.28. The shaft had a diameter of 0.80-0.85 and a depth (measured from 17-Floor 4) of 0.75 to a level where a single slab stone was found. The shaft may have continued below this point for another 0.18. The sides of the shaft were not coated in any way. The four large slab stones found above the shaft (Fig. 6) must have been its cover "lid" and in order not to fall into the shaft one or two wooden rafters must have been lying across the shaft. During the excavation of the shaft we did not note any support for such rafters. The original top of the cover stones would thus have been c. 9.34, i.e. 0.04-05 above the floor. Clearly a quarter of a circle of stones were placed on 17-Floor 4 around the cover stones (Pl. 29c-d). The floor was found below the stone circle and it continued towards the edge of the shaft. There are indications that the shaft also went out of use while 17-Floor 4 was still functioning. It seem likely that the stone circle was formed at a time when the shaft went out of use and that the whole corner inside the stone circle was used for rubbish or other purposes. This probably means, as mentioned above, that rubbish had been piled in the north corner of Room A forming a dump, thus belonging to the 17-Floor 4 stratum. The reusers apparently were only interested in access to the door of Room B. This is also the way most of the joining sherds may have become scattered. Furthermore, it should be noted that the burnt eastern part of 17-Floor 4 only went up to the stone circle and did not extent beyond it (Pl. 29a-b). The top of four of the stones from the circle were visible on the surface of 17-Floor 1. Floor 1 surely extended so much above the cover stones II and IV (*Fig. 6*) that the shaft could not very well have been in use contemporary with Floor 1.

Some of the Handmade Burnished Ware jar fragments (80-P 1046+) were sealed below 17-Floor 1 and lying on 17-Floor 4 inside the stone circle, therefore they must belong to this floor. (*Fig. 9D, Pls. 28c, 29b*). The same is true for the larnax fragments 80-P 0843 and the storage jar 80-P 0889 from floors 1 and 4 and layer with stones.

Apparently 17-Floor 4 is the one which belonged to the LM IIIB:1 destruction of the house since it was above this floor that we found the clearest traces of fire and burning. We must thus recognize a (short?) reuse of this room and it may perhaps be connected to the latest floor in Room B with the sherd floor (cf. below p. 48). If this observation is correct it may be conjectured that this part of Building 1 had been partly reused before its final collapse. Apparently there are no signs of reuse in the Rooms C and D and the layers between the layer with stones and the floor deposits may have belonged to accumulated soil. Only at a later point then we do get the final collapse of the building whereby all the stones of the walls fell and formed "the layer with stones".

17-Floor 4. Two different parts of a surface can be distinguished: the eastern part had an orange-red surface with charcoal and ash. In the western part the floor was less or not at all burnt.

Below 17-Floor 1 and above 17-Floor 4 the soil was reddish-brown, rather compact with small stones, with pieces of charcoal and a lot of ash just above the floor. The upper part inside the shaft had very loose soil, soft dark brown, with small pieces of charcoal and many small dots from sea-shells. In the lower part we found loose, fine grained, sandy soil with quite a lot of charcoal pieces. The small white fragments from sea-shells are not so significant any more. The bottom of the shaft contained fine green soil. The shaft contained many points from sea-urchins – might it perhaps have been intended to keep some kind of seafood, perhaps in some kind of coated basketry?

These deposits contained several very small baskets which could not be dated with certainty, while the remaining ones with the possible exception of the bottom of the shaft all contained LM IIIB. 1 sherd EM was noted and few MM, LM I and LM IIIA. 29.110 kg of pottery were collected: 10% decorated, 92% kept and 3.5% inventoried. Shapes were not counted in 1980 and no shapes to be counted in 1984.

Comments: The collected carbonized wood came from 17-Floor 4 and the upper part of the shaft, i.e. above the two lower slab stones. Also, finds were almost exclusively confined to the shaft where noteworthy are the tools (polishers and a pumice stone used as whetstone), the fragment of a terracotta leg, the many shells, part of a large stone vase and a KS whorl. As with 17-Floor 1 surprisingly few pieces of obsidian, i.e. virtually no finds on neither 17-Floor 1 nor 17-Floor 4. The exceptions are a few pieces of obsidian and one small fragment of a stone vase.

Concerning the joins, it is interesting to note the many between layer with stones, upper floor, lower floor and shaft and also that the three lower deposits have several joins to the neighbouring rooms B, D and Corridor/Space I. All of these probably originated from the lower floor and shaft and they are evidence of witness to a large scale scatter of sherds from the final destruction of this room in connection with or immediately after the destruction. A further point in support of this may perhaps also be found in the fact that almost none of the vases were complete.

There is a very high percentage of LW. In this connection it may be worthy of note, that the bottom of the shaft contained "almost only LW". Surprisingly little burnt pottery was noted. A soil sample from inside the shaft was collected.

Constructions and related deposit(s) (*Figs. 10-11*, *Pl. 30*)

17-Floor 4

17-Floor 4 was *c*. 0.08 thick and there is no indication in the notebook that the floor had a real packing (but see below). Perhaps noteworthy is the burnt area to the east indicating that a severe fire must have taken place in this part of the room. In 1980 the floor was described as hard packed red-dish-orange soil mixed with ash-spots in the eastern part, more yellow and not burnt in the western part. In 1984 the floor was just noted as dry greyish-red. The pottery noted in the floor was MM, LM I, LM IIIA and LM IIIB. 2.640 kg of pottery were collected: 5% decorated, 80% kept and 3.2% inventoried. Shapes counted (1984): 1 footed cup.

Comments: Clearly this floor was laid in the LM IIIB:1 period.

17-Pit J (Fig. 10, Pl. 76c)

Below 17-Floor 4 we came upon a small, deep pit which cut through the underlying floors. The pit is situated in the area around 510.8-511.7/700-700.5 and had a depth of 0.12. Loose sandy brown soil. The pit contained only little coarse ware of LM I and LM III date. 0.665 kg of pottery was collected: 0% decorated, 96% kept and 0% inventoried. No shapes to be counted.

Comments: The purpose of this small pit remains unclear.


17-Floor 15 (Figs. 7b, 10-11, Pls. 30, 31a)


Below 17-Floor 4 we found 17-Floor 15. It covered all of the preserved part of Room A and may perhaps be considered as a floor-packing for Floor 4. It was excavated at levels from 9.29-9.24 down to 9.16-9.17 and it was situated right on top of the underlying floors connected to 17-Wall 7 which belongs to an LM IIIA:2 building (*Fig. 11*). In 1980 the soil was described as soft, burnt reddish-brown to orange soil with orange spots of burnt clay, while in 1984 the soil was dry, hard packed light brown with some lime. The pottery was preliminary dated MM, LM IIIA and LM IIIB. 2.760 kg of pottery were collected: 2% decorated, 36% kept and 1.9% inventoried. Shapes were not counted in 1980 and no shapes could be counted in 1984.

Deposit (Fig. 11)

Below 17-Floor 4 there was a small triangle of soil in the southwestern part which may be connected to the period of 17-Floor 4, for which reason it is included here. It is a very small area situated around 509.25/700 excavated into a depth of 0.60-70, i.e. almost to the level of the LM I floor of House IV, Room C (cf. Hallager & Tzedakis 1986, fig. 3). The deposit contained reddish-brown soft soil recalling the description of the soil below the original floor of the

underlying building, and most of the pottery/finds may also belong here.

Preliminary dates: MM, LM I, LM IIIA, B. 0.840 kg of pottery was collected: 10% decorated, 82% kept and 6.7% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Comments: The joins seem to indicate an LM IIIA:2 context for the sherds, perhaps indicating something about the date and use of 17-Wall 7, i.e. the LM IIIA:2 Building 1. This deposit, in all probability, is a mixture between LM I and LM II/IIIA:2, but it might have functioned as a levelling deposit for 17-Floor 4 which was the earliest in the IIIB:1 Building 1. Statistically there is too little to be of statistical value.

17-Pit I (Fig. 11, Pl. 31b)

The pit was found at level 8.47 below the foundation pit to

Venetian walls W1-019, 021 (GSE I, 160-163) and it went far below the level of the original floor of the underlying LM IIIA:2 Building into which the pit might have been dug and presumably filled - at any rate before the wall between the Rooms A and D, 17-Wall 4 was constructed since this wall overlaid the pit. Since the pit contains LM IIIB pottery another explanation could have been that the 17-Pit I, derived from a "pocket" of "fallen-out" soil in connection with the construction of the Venetian walls, as seen in many other instances. The pit was not dug to the bottom and we did not note at what level the excavation stopped – but it was deep and cut into the deposits of LM I House IV. It contained medium soft, dark red-brown earth with several stones. The pottery noted was LM IIIA, some MM/LM I and LM IIIB. 8.700 kg of pottery were collected: 14% decorated, 76% kept and 3.2% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Comments: The amphoroid krater (LW) and footed cup is definitely LM IIIB:1 while some of the remaining sherds may be older. It is quite unusual for large pits not to contain small finds. Only "natural" joins were found, relatively little LW, and a high percentage of decorated pottery was noted.


ROOM B (Figs. 12-13, Pls. 16b:6, 31c-f)

Room B is situated right below the layer with stones and has only a thin layer of floor deposit (*Fig. 16b:6*). Nothing was found *in situ* on this floor. The preserved part of Room B measures at least 1.40×1.10 while the length of the northeastern wall can on the northern side be measured at a length of 2.83 indicating a room with a minimum size of 4 m², i.e. only a very small part of the eastern corner is preserved. The preserved part of the room is lying within the square 508.5-510/700.5-703.4. Two doors were found leading into the room – both from lower lying Rooms A and C.

The floor itself, found at level 9.51, however, is interesting in that its surface consists of broken potsherds – a feature noted for the first time in Khania. The sherd floor was laid upon an earlier pebble floor at level 9.46, which was noted in the eastern and northern part of the "sherd floor."

The doors leading into this room are both interesting and different in construction. The door to Room C clearly consists of two bases for wooden posts and one relatively small stone as the actual threshold. The width of the door between the bases is 0.58. The actual threshold is found 0.11 below the surface of the "sherd floor" of Room B, while the bases for the wooden posts are found 0.05 below the floor. This is a rather unusual arrangement, since in the Courtyard in front of Building 2 we see that also thresholds are newly constructed when the floors are risen in level (cf. below, p. 237). The southernmost base and the threshold are of limestone while the northernmost base is of sandstone. Arrangements for a pivot-hole were found in the floor of Room C. The door to Room A seems to be of the same type as that of Room C, only less care seems to have been taken in choosing the stones for the different components. The bases for the posts are not – as is usually seen – one stone in the full width and partly missing in the southern part while the threshold does not have an even surface. As with the other door both limestone and sandstone has been used. The threshold is (in both doors) supported from below by several smaller stones (e.g. Pl. 31c-d). The walls, 17-Wall 3 and 17-Wall 5, are described in connection with Rooms A and C respectively (above p. 41 and below pp. 53-54).

The soil of the floor deposit is soft reddish-brown with pieces of charcoal and lime. Some concentrations of greyish



burnt soil – in the door to Room A lots of charcoal. LM IIIB were found in all baskets, possibly also few IIIA and LM I. 5.290 kg of pottery were collected: 11% decorated, 71% kept and 1.6% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.



Comments: The joins are intriguing in that two go to 17-Floor 4 and one to 17-Floor 1 in Room A. It probably means that there must have been a reuse of Room A and probably of Room B as well, since the sherd floor was found at a level



higher than the thresholds, while the pebble floor was approximately at the level with the thresholds. It would probably have been an inside room since both the floors of Rooms C and A were lying at lower levels (rain etc.). It must be noted, that the wall south of the door to Room A appear too disturbed to be definite about its appearance.

ROOM C




Fig. 14. LM IIIB:1 Room C, plan of between layer with stones and floor and distribution of finds.

Between layer with stones and floor (*Figs. 14-15*, *Pls. 15c:16a, 20 (bottom), 16b:5*)

In most of Room C (Fig. 14) there was, as in Room D, a layer above the floor deposit and below the layer with the fallen stones which looked much like the latter, but which apparently contained less stones. It should be noted, though, that this layer is exclusively situated below the level of the surrounding walls and especially in the western part, where the walls are high this layer is more likely to belong to the floor deposit. The deposit was excavated from levels c. 9.90-9.70 down to 9.50-9.30. The soil in the many "baskets" excavated over several years have been slightly differently described: light brown and loose soil, dry and with small stones; soft brown-grey-brown, stones, thin; rather hard, light brown with pieces of charcoal and many sherds, stones of all sizes, some big fallen; red slightly sandy with several fallen stones (medium-sized). All baskets contained LM IIIB, in some were also noted LM IIIA and furthermore a few sherds of LM I, MM and a single EM. From one basket several pieces of Venetian/Turkish pottery were inventoried. This was not noted in the preliminary datings and is probably due to contamination of labels in the boxes after the excavation. 45.265 kg of pottery were collected: 14% decorated, 62% kept and 1.6% inventoried. Shapes were not counted in 1977 and 1980 and no shapes could be counted in 1987.




Fig. 15. Room C, section A-A; cf. Figs. 14, 16 and 19.

Relatively few bones from adult *Ovis* and *Bos*, while caprid and *Sus* were represented with both young and adult animals.

Comments: The 1980 joins are all "natural" and to the floor deposit in the southern part of Room C while the joins from the northern part are more interesting in that they connect to the eastern part of the excavation, showing joins also noted in the LM IIIB:2 levels between same areas. Could this be due to disturbances after the LM IIIB:1 destruction? There is a high percentage of Mycenaean imports and a surprisingly low percentage of burnt pottery.

Floor deposit (*Figs. 15-16, Pls. 15c:18, 16b:7-8, 32, 33a-b*)

Room C is - apart from where it is cut by the Venetian Wall foundation, W1-018 - completely preserved with all four walls. The room measures $5.00-5.30 \times 2.85$ and covers an inside area of almost 15 m^2 . It is divided into two parts: the northern (mainly excavated in 1977) and a southern part mainly excavated in 1980 (with supplementary excavations in 1983-84 and 1987). Physically the division was marked by a small buttress wall around 509.5/705.8 built up against 14-Wall 3a. In the northern part a c. 0.40 high bench up against the southeastern wall, 17-Wall 9 was noted. The most marked difference while excavating, was that the northern part was virtually without pottery on the floor deposit while in the southern part more than 100 kg of pottery were found including ten restored and nine vases with full profile and substantial parts of storage stirrup jars and jugs. Most of these vases have probably been standing in a cupboard in the southern part of 14-Wall 3a. The amount of pottery from this area can be clearly sensed on Pl. 32c.




Fig. 16. LM IIIB:1 Room C, plan of floor deposit and distribution of finds.

The cupboard: The indications for the cupboard (apart from the pottery, of which only two were found on the floor) are as follows. In the west corner of the room along the southwest wall, 17-Wall 5, a row of stones was found - mainly flat stones and slab stones apparently packed in almost pure sand and with no pottery present. Right above the floor were noted several slab stones and some sandy soil in an area roughly at the middle of the supposed cupboard (Pl. 32d). The cupboard may thus have been constructed in the following way: At the bottom flat stones were packed with sand. The buttress constituted the northern part. In the southern part stones were stacked up against 17-Wall 5 and another pile of flat stones were laid halfway between these. At a suitable height a wooden plank was laid across. The procedure was repeated for the second shelf etc. Such a cupboard is almost the only way the finds in the southern part of Room C can be explained. What might perhaps have been stored in the northern part is very uncertain - perishable material may be a valid suggestion. The scatter of sherds over all the southern part of the room seems to indicate that the content of the shelves fell inwards into the room in connection with the destruction. Perhaps also the small finds were stored on the shelves as they were almost exclusively concentrated to the "cupboard area".

The walls: The walls are all preserved to a considerable height above the floor – in several places more than 1 metre (*Fig. 15*). The poorest preserved wall is 17-Wall 9 (*Figs. 16-17*), which was a new construction of the LM IIIB:1 period. Up against this wall, in the northern part, a bench was constructed (*Pls. 32a* and *33b*) while in the southern part of the wall the door was found leading into Room D (*Pls. 30, 33e* and *34b*). The wall had a width of *c*. 0.65 and there was not noted any plaster in connection with the wall. It was constructed in the usual sandwich technique by unworked, medium sized stones. 17-Wall 5 was also a new wall of the LM IIIB:1 period since the floor of the LM IIIA:2 Building goes below it (*Fig. 15*). It was not excavated in its full width, but it appears to have been of the usual width of *c*. 0.65. In the south part the

door leading into Room B was found (cf. above p. 48, and Pl. 31d, f). Also this wall was of the sandwich type, although several worked, probably reused stones were noted (Pl. 33a). 14-Wall 3a (Fig. 18) was also a new LM IIIB:1 construction in that the underlying LM IIIIA:2 Building in this area seems to have reused the walls of the LM I period. The wall is of the width of 0.65 and of the sandwich type built mainly of unworked stones. The section of the wall (Fig. 35 C-C) shows that the bottom of the wall starts at two very different levels facing Room C and Space G respectively. On the side from Space G it was seen to be constructed partly upon an LM I wall (Fig. 18). None of the three aforementioned walls seem to have had wall foundations. 14-Wall 4, however, used the underlying LM I wall as a foundation. This LM IIIB:1 wall was of the usual width leaving a small, visible part of the LM I wall facing Room C. Contrary to the other walls it was built by rather large stones going in the full width across the wall (Pl. 32a).

The bench: Along the northwestern side of 17-Wall 9 a corner of a stone structure was noted which may have been a bench or a platform. It did not continue all the way up to 14-Wall 4 and its southwestern part was destroyed by the Venetian wall W1-018. On this structure see further below p. 62.

The doors: Two doors were found in Room C, one leading into Room D and another leading into Room B. The one leading into Room D consisted of a rather large slab 0.55×0.65 bordered by stones which probably functioned as bases for wooden posts (*Pls. 30* and *34b*). The large slab in the door was partly covered by the same earthen floor as found in Room C (*Pl. 33e*). The door leading into Room B is described above p. 48. Inside Room C in the very south corner, a rather small ring of stones was noted – these were probably set as wedges to keep a wooden block with a pivot hole in place (see below p. 261, *Pls. 30* and *31d*, *f*).

Right above the floor in the northern part it was noted that the soil was, in some areas, black. The black area was running from *c*. 1 metre south of 14-Wall 4 and did not contain very much pottery. It was in this small area that the only half-complete vase of the northern part of Room C was discovered: the lower part of a small stirrup jar (77-P 0457). Up against 14-Wall 3a "traces of burnt clay" were noted. In the very south corner of the room in front of the door to Room B was an area with looser brown soil and many small stones. The floor is described as a yellow clay floor with some burnt parts. It is slightly destroyed in the western part.

From the description of the soils, the burnt pottery and the burnt floor it seems most likely that this room – as Room A – was destroyed by fire although not as violent a fire as seen in the LM IB destructions, but apparently much less wood/ timber was involved in the construction of this house. The floor deposit was excavated over several years and it seems in general that the soil was the typical red-brownish burnt noted also in other rooms. The soil contained several pieces of burnt clay, many small pieces of charcoal and bits of lime. Several slab stones were also noted among the fallen stones. Up against 14-Wall 3a, a piece of *kouskouras*.

All datable baskets contained LM IIIB pottery, in some LM IIIA and LM I were noted. In a few MM was noted and

in one basket a few sherds of EM. 113.187 kg of pottery were collected: 26% decorated, 84% kept and 2.4% inventoried. Shapes were not counted in 1977, 1980 and 1983 and no shapes to be counted in 1984 and 1987.

BONES

A concentration of bones was found on the floor just north of the door leading into Room D (*Pl. 32b*). Represented from the whole floor deposit were adult *Capra*, *Sus* and *Bos*, while *Ovis* and caprid were represented with both adult and young animals. The fragment of a corner

tooth of the lower jaw from *Sus* must have been very large. The deposit contained an unusually high percentage of caprid: 88%.

SHELLS

1 *Glycymeris* – water-worn, small/medium. 2 *Pinna* – frgs. (83-MISC 001 and 84-MISC 028).

Comments: The only two vases found *in situ* on the floor were the decorated bowl 80-P 0864 (*Fig. 16A*) and the plain kylix 83-P 0002 (*Fig. 16B*). The reason that no more vases were complete is undoubtedly due to the disturbance of the room by the construction of the Venetian wall foundation and perhaps also to the fact that some of the vases had been placed high on the shelves and therefore did not find their way to the floor deposit. Thus they might have disappeared in later (Minoan) disturbances.

The many finds of plaster – some with black spots from burning – taken together with the frequent mention of lime in the soil descriptions indicate that the walls may have been plastered. Apart from the obsidian, there were not many small finds. Two of the bronzes and the two KS-whorls may have been stored in the supposed cupboard.

All joins except one are "natural". The join to the floor of the Corridor may perhaps be part of the same "scatter" as noted in Room A. Quite a high percentage of LW and very few sherds from pithoi indicate that none had been in the room. Reasonably high percentage of burnt pottery. The one modern sherd is intrusive. High percentage of inventoried and a very high amount of decorated pottery (compared to average for LM IIIB:1). Considering the many complete/ restorable vases this percentage may be closer to the truth than when only sherds are considered. Also worthy of note is the presence of one oversized stirrup jar and fragments from another seven large stirrup jars two of which were inscribed with Linear B.




Fig. 17. Room C, section of 17-Wall 9 and 17-Wall 3, southeastern side.

Constructions (Figs. 15, 17-19)

In Room C two floors were noted: the upper with the floor deposit, 14-Floor 3 (+17-Floor 5 and 23-Floor 4), which partly covered the threshold to Room D and a lower (17-Floor 8), only a few centimetres below. Below the lower floor we noted in the south part one more floor (17-Floor 14) which belongs to the LM IIIA:2 building (as in Room A), while this was *not* discovered in the northern part, where a few centimetres, however, were excavated as a levelling deposit.




Fig. 19. LM IIIB:1 Room C, plan of constructions and distribution of finds.

Furthermore, a little of 17-Wall 9 (*Fig. 19*), was excavated together with the bench in front of it, and a little material comes from the northwestern part of 14-Wall 3a, in connection with a cleaning operation.

In upper floor

14-Floor 3 was, in the north part, described as very hard, light brown, clay-like soil. In the south part the floor was hard packed reddish-brown, not very burnt but with many small pieces of charcoal. In the eastern part, which was 0.02-01 thick, a medium hard thin layer of greyish-brown soil with charcoal pieces appeared. Below this the lower floor, 17-Floor 8, was discovered at levels 9.19 to 9.13. In the north corner of

the cupboard the soil was fat, dark red, greyish-brown. The floor contained some MM and LM I and few LM IIIA and B pieces. 1.945 kg of pottery was collected: 7% decorated, 60% kept and 5% inventoried. Shapes were not counted in 1978 and 1980 and no shapes to be counted in 1987.

9.17/9.11 to 9.13/8.97 a thin layer as levelling deposit. Stratigraphically the layer was found below 14-Floor 3 and it was also seen to continue below the bench and 17-Wall 9. The soil was soft to medium soft, dark brown. In the west part were some stones. In all baskets were noted MM and LM I, while in one basket was noted one fragment dated to LM III. 11.725 kg of pottery were collected: 5% decorated, 46% kept and 0.5% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Bench/walls

Up against the northern part of the 17-Wall 9 the remains of a small bench were found. It was roughly 0.65 wide. Length unknown, at least 0.90 - perhaps as much as 1.90, i.e. if the one stone discovered in the northeast corner of Tr. 17 belonged to the bench (Fig. 19). It did not extend all the way up to 14-Wall 4, where 0.50 of floor was left free. During the excavation, regrettably, 17-Wall 9 and the bench were not separated, but excavated as one unit. The bench was raised 0.40-45 above the upper floor of Room C on which is was resting and not going through. The surface of the bench, consisting mainly of flat stones, was not even. It seems to have been build with reused stones. Some were broken ashlar-blocks in sandstone, while others were unworked. There are only a few smaller stones among the bigger ones. There was no packing of smaller stones at the bottom of the bench/wall. No mention of mortar, but probably the usual. For the walls see above under floor deposit general description. LM I, LM III, one piece IIIA was noted. 0.720 kg of pottery was collected: 10% decorated, 72% kept and 0% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

A few cleaning operations were carried out on the northern part of 14-Wall 3a from which a few sherds were collected and one piece of gold.




Fig. 20. LM IIIB:1 Room D, plan of between layers with stones and floor and distribution of finds.

Between layer with stones and floor (*Figs. 20-21*, *Pls. 15a:7*, *15b:9 top*, *10*, *16a:6*, *8-9*, *16c:44*)

As was the case in Room C a deposit existed between the floor and the layer with stones. It is reminiscent of Room C, but with less stones. It was identified in the entire room and it was excavated at levels from c. 9.60 and 9.55 down to c. 9.30 and 9.40. C. 1.2 metres southeast of the door to Room C an area was noted with looser soil and smaller stones (17-Pit G, Fig. 20, Pls. 29c, 33e) and practically no pottery. This went almost all the way down to the floor of Room D (Pl. *33e*). The soil contains several stones of all sizes: a few slab stones, more reddish among the stones, in most places rather hard, yellowish-brown and red with pieces of charcoal and bits of lime. In a small pit-like area the soil was brown, soft and sandy. All baskets contained LM IIIB, while several also contained LM IIIA, LM I and few MM. 21.160 kg of pottery were collected: 12% decorated, 62% kept and 2.1% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.




Fig. 21. Room D, section A-A; cf. Figs. 20, 22 and 23.



BONES

Few bones from adult *Ovis*, *Capra* and caprid and from young *Sus* and *Bos*.

Comments: It is noteworthy that the joins from this deposit are "external". Here it is more likely that the joins belong with the layer with stones than to the floor deposit. Only very few indications of fire were noted in this deposit. Worthy of note is the constant presence of bits of lime which continue all the way down to the floor.



Floor deposit (Figs. 21-22, Pls. 15b:9 (lower part),

16а:7, 10, 16с:39, 33с-е, 34)

Room D was a roughly rectangular room measuring 3.90 to 4.15 in width and 4.75 to 5.40 in length; thus covering a little more than 20 m². In the northern part the room was destroyed by a Turkish pit, and the Venetian walls W1-018 and W1-019 were cutting through the room which was also in the eastern part, disturbed by a late pit (cf. above p. 32). However, large parts of all the walls were preserved. The floor deposit excavated from levels at 9.30 and 9.40 down to the floor at 9.00 to 9.08 appeared to be fairly homogeneous all over the area. Compared to Room C (south part) very little pottery was found in here and - in fact - only one restorable bowl (80-P 0866+) can be attributed to this room. In the western part it was explicitly mentioned that nothing was found on the floor. In the southern part of the room a grey surface with red below was noted indicating that the floor, which was hard, had been burnt. In the very south corner the upper floor seems to have

been destroyed, while the underlying floor became visible (at 8.96). It was in this part that the whetstone, the polisher and the complete loom weight were found. For a detailed description of the floor, see below under "constructions". The floor was obviously burnt in the southern part and in all the deposits right above the floor bits of charcoal were noted.

During the excavation of this room several pieces of lime were found, and taken together with the collected plaster fragments (here also with spots of black from burning) it indicates that the walls had been plastered (*Pl. 33c*). Two observations seem to indicate that the walls had first been coated with *kouskouras* and then covered with plaster: the big piece of *kouskouras* found up against 17-Wall 4 from 511.2/701.8 to 511.75/701.2 (*Pl. 33e*) "must originate from some kind of clay lining"; and "On top of the floor to the east of W1-019, there is a deposit of yellow *kouskouras*, mixed together with pithos sherds". Might this material also have been attached to the wall?

The soil in the floor deposit was not homogenous all over the room. The main characteristic was a reddish-brown soil mainly medium soft, but in places rather hard packed. Noted everywhere were many pieces of plaster and bits of charcoal and a few smaller stones and in areas pieces of mud-brick and smaller pieces of *kouskouras*. In the very southern corner a red-brownish, soft soil with a lot of charcoal and many bones was noted. In all baskets LM IIIB were noted, in several also LM IIIA and in some a few pieces of EM, MM, LM I and very few sherds LM II. 44.920 kg of pottery were collected: 10% decorated, 75% kept and 1.9% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Comments: One of the baskets in the western part provided

evidence for an area with "much plaster in pieces". In the very western part nothing was found *in situ* on the floor. If the room was used for storage it would probably have been perishable goods, now disintegrated. Neither do the small finds indicate the function of the room. It seems that the room would have been emptied before the walls collapsed – it is only in the small shallow pit in the very south corner that a few things might have been left *in situ*. This seem in accordance with our observations in Room A; that the building did not collapse immidiately after the destruction. For the restorable vase 80-P 0866+, all joins except the one to the upper floor in Room A are "natural", but also the sherds joining the corridor have been spread! There is a low percentage of LW, burnt and decorated pottery.

Constructions (Figs. 21, 23-25, Pl. 34a, c-f)

To the constructions in this room: we have the floor, the walls and the bench.

The floor, 17-Floor 6, was discovered in most of the room at level c. 9.08 to 9.00 and in most of the room there was only one floor level. In the southeastern part of the room, however, two floors were recognized - the upper one (15-Floor 1a) at level c. 9.11 with the lower floor below. The lower floor - a continuation of 17-Floor 6, found all over the room - was at the same level as that belonging to the floors of the LM IIIA:2 Building (cf. below, pp. 200, 202). It is considered most likely that this floor was reused in Room D with additional repairs mainly in the southeastern part. In connection with this it should also be noted that LM IIIB pottery was only (in the preliminary dating) noted in the upper floor indicating that it was a repair or a later addition to the original one (Fig. 21). At two other places in the area 514-516.5/701-702 minor repairs to the floor were noted. On this upper floor there were not noted many signs of fire. Considering the uncertainty and possibility for trodden down pieces in the unrepaired part of the floor, both the lower floor and the repair is here taken out as one although the lower floor in fact belongs to the LM IIIA:2 Building. In the southeastern part, the repaired floor consisted of a light brown-yellowish-reddish clay mixed with small pieces of charcoal, some small stones and "lots of pottery", while below there was a thin levelling deposit which was clayish, reddish-brown with pieces of charcoal and small pieces of lime and pieces of clay. In the northwestern part the floor was hard packed, reddish-brown with pieces of charcoal and lime. Also here a possible levelling deposit was noted of a rather hard, burnt, dark brownish-red soil with pieces of charcoal, kouskouras, lime and burnt clay. Then there is a mention of small stones, and relatively large amounts of sherds in the floor indicates a well constructed floor, where a real packing has been attempted. In the very south corner of the room a pit was found which is stratigraphically considered to belong with the construction of the floor. It went c. 0.07 below the level of the floor. On the top it was yellowish-green and below loose with many small stones and dark grey-brown. Unlike most pits it did not contain charcoal and bones.

The bench (*Pls. 34a, c-d*): Like in Room C, there was also in Room D – up against 17-Wall 9 – constructed a bench rising c.


0.35 above the floor and set up against the wall. The floor was not found below the bench and most likely the floor had been destroyed in connection with the construction of the bench. The front part except for the very corner consists of rather large stones. At the short end it is built up of smaller stones and slabs towards the wall of Room C. The surface of the bench has large rather flat stones, the northern one being of schist. One of the stones is an upright slab stone. All up against the wall is a row of very small stones. Inside the bench only small stones were found. There was a lot of earthen yellowish-brown, clay-ish mortar in the bench. It has a width of *c*. 0.55 and is preserved in a length of 0.85. The original extension is unknown.

The walls: only a small part of the walls in the east corner of the room have been excavated/removed.




Fig. 24b. Room D, section of 15-Wall 2, northeastern side.

15-Wall 2 (Fig. 24a-b): is a construction for the LM IIIA:2 Building. Only the southern part is preserved. Running in the same line as the wall between LM I Houses I and IV, in the northern part constructed directly upon it in other places constructed above an LM IIIA:1 pit. In this part of the wall there was originally a door around 516.75/702 with a large threshold at 9.21 leading to Space I (Pl. 34f). At some point this door was filled in. The door was filled with mainly smaller stones and the mortar was grevish-brown clay with small stones and pottery. The KS whorl (78-TC 010) seems to give an LM IIIB:1 post quem for the blocking up of the door. To judge from the nice surface on *both* sides of the wall it seems to have been blocked up when both Room D and Space I were still in use, i.e. it happened before the LM IIIB:1 destruction. On Fig. 24a-b and Pl. 34e the wall with the filled in door is seen clearly while Pl. 34f shows the original arrangement with the door and large threshold at the bottom. The remaining part of the wall is built with a mixture of smaller and larger stones of different sorts - probably mainly reused from the destroyed LM I buildings. The wall was of the usual sandwich type with some larger stones crossing the whole width of the wall (0.60-65). In the part actually excavated from 517/701.75 to 518/700.75 the following was noted: "... 15-Wall 2 was constructed of reused stones and slabs worked and unworked stones among each other. In the middle of the wall there was a filling consisting of small stones and clay." The mortar was greyish-brown clay with small stones and some pottery.

15-Wall 3 (Pl. 15a) is, in all probability, also a construction of the LM IIIA:2 Building. It could be followed in all its length of 3.90, while in the southern part only the inner surface could be seen. In the northern part (which has been excavated) was noted a 0.90 interval up to the 15-Wall 2 where the wall consisted of two flat stones c. 0.35 wide (Pl. 33d). The surface of this stone was at 9.51, i.e. c. 0.45 above the floor of Room D and c. 0.10 above the floor of the corridor and no wall was discovered at this spot. Might there have been a window between the two or a door with wooden steps leading down to Room D? The wall was constructed much like 15-Wall 2 in the sandwich technique, but also with some stones going all the way across the width of the wall. The mortar of the wall was like the 15-Wall 2: greyish-brown clay with small stones and some pottery. The part of the wall facing Room D is seen on Pls. 33d and 35d.




Fig. 25a. Room D, section of 17-Wall 4, northeastern side.

17-Wall 4 (Figs. 23, 25a-b, Pl. 30) is a construction of the



LM IIIB:1 period, built, as it is, over the floor of the LM IIIA:2 building. It has a length of 4.6, but is disrupted in the southern part by the Venetian W1-019. It has a width of c. 0.6 and is preserved at a height of up to 0.85. It is of the usual sandwich type with only a few stones going all the way across the wall. The stones used are a mixture of unworked and worked, probably reused stones. 17-Wall 9 (*Fig. 23*) is described under Room C (cf. above p. 62)

Door leading to Room C (*Pl. 34b*) is described under Room C (cf. above p. 54). In the very west corner of Room D a pivot hole was noted in the soil indicating that a door may have existed in Room D.

Door leading to Space I (*Fig. 26, Pl. 34f*) consisted of an oblong squarish limestone. This threshold was not flanked by stones to carry wooden posts, and we noted no sign of a pivot hole since a pit had been dug in front of the door in Room D. The threshold was c. 0.15 above the upper floor of Room D and c. 0.20 above the lower floor.

In the floor

Only in the southeastern part, i.e. the upper repaired floor, were a few LM IIIB sherds noted in the preliminary dating, while in the remaining part LM IIIA was noted as the latest pottery. The floor and levelling deposit also included several fragments of LM II and LM I was noted in almost all baskets. Furthermore, a few fragments from earlier periods. 23.705 kg of pottery were collected: 13% decorated, 73% kept and 3.0% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Comments: The exact position of the percussion stone was not noted, i.e. whether it might have been found between the stones of the surface (and as such is a possible "active" tool) or whether it was part of the general fill. The latter, however, is more likely. The join is, in principle, coming from the same context: soil used in connection with construction of floor and bench respectively. It is important and interesting that the join comes from the area where there were two floors indicating that the bench and the repaired floor *might* be contemporaneous.

The filled in door

LM I and LM III noted. 0.950 kg of pottery was collected: 16% decorated, 100% kept and 1.5% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

In one case LM IIIB was noted, which – if true – must be contamination from scarp (78-P 0450). Otherwise LM IIIA, LM II, LM I. 2.605 kg of pottery were collected: 7% decorated, 66% kept and 1.6% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Comments: It is not unusual with a few pieces of obsidian in the walls. The joins to 78-P 0450, an amphoroid krater, belongs to the scatter of Room A (cf. above) and the corridor but the actual sherd here is probably *not* from inside the wall which was in this area excavated up to the scarp. In all probability it derives from the corridor and is thus a "natural" join.

CORRIDOR/SPACE I (*Figs. 26, 27a-b, Pls. 15a:7a, 16c:34 (top), 36, 38, 19b:16, 17, 35a-d, 36a-c, 37a-c, 38a-d*)

In LM IIIB:1, Corridor and Space I formed an L-shaped space in the building. There are no indications that any sort of wall in this period separated the two areas. In the Corridor and the very southern part of Space I the floor was




Fig. 25b. Room D, section of 17-Wall 4, southwestern side.

well-preserved while in the remaining part of the space it was rather destroyed by later activities (7/8-Wall 1, see *GSE* III, 38 and fig. 6, and a Turkish pit and a Modern well, Well 3) and in places only identified with some uncertainty. In the very northern part there are indications of at least a change in levels at 9.48/9.44 where two slabs were also found (*Pl. 38a*). It is possibly in connection with this floor(?) that we must see the complete vase 71-P 0163 (*Fig 26*, A).

The walls of the space were to a large extent preserved very well. Towards the west, two walls of Room D, 15-Wall 2 and 15-Wall 3, towards the south to the Street, 18-Wall 2 and 13-Wall 2, towards the southeast to Room U, 13-Wall 4, towards the east to Room E, 13-Wall 2a, 7-Wall 3, 6-Wall 3, and towards the northwest to the Annex, 6-Wall 2. It seems likely that the oblique wall going from *c*. 521.5/702.5 to 518.5/704.5, 13-Wall 2a – giving both Corridor/Space I and Room E a peculiar shape – was built in this period. The floor of the Corridor-part could be followed in the length *c*. 6.25 and it had a width of *c*. 1.20 to 1.75. Space I had a length of 6.20 and a width varying from 2.00 to 3.10. Corridor/Space I thus covers (floor area) *c*. 23 m².

At least three doors were found in Corridor/Space I: One opening to the Street south which had at some point been blocked – corresponding floors between the Corridor and the street were noted (see below p. 78). One large threshold leads into Room E. The threshold into Room D, noted in 15-Wall 2, had probably been blocked in this period since the floor of Space I was at this point 0.20 higher than the threshold. There might also have been a possible connection between the Corridor and Room D across the narrow part in 15-Wall 3 (see above under Room D, p. 68).

Space I was reused in LM IIIB:2 and LM IIIC (cf. *GSE* II, 39-45 and III, 38-40) for which reason no floor deposit was

found here, while the Corridor, which was not reused had both a floor deposit and a layer with fallen stones recognized above the Rooms A-D. Both were, however, excavated together as floor deposit.

In the Corridor two storage pits or rather shafts were noted. The one (13-Pit U) was situated around 521.25/702. It was 0.53 deep and sunk in this pit was a decorated jar (77-P 0876) with a body diameter of c. 0.59. The floor of the Corridor was found above the jar indicating that this pit became disused before the Corridor. The other (8-Pit T) was situated around 519.5/700.6. It was c. 0.80 deep and no jar or special coating was noted. Apparently this pit also became disused before the Corridor, since a curious structure consisting of three rows of stones was constructed on top of it: one row with smaller stones up against 18-Wall 2, then a row of three large stones all with the surface 0.45 above the floor and finally with an outer row of four stones set more or less upright in front of the three large ones (Pl. 35a-b). These stones were set right on the floor. This stone construction was never properly excavated. But the position of a c. 0.45 high stone construction (measuring $c.0.9 \times 1.2$) precisely on top of a deep shaft cannot be there by chance, although no obvious explanation or parallels can be thought of. Nothing particular was noted in the pit – except for a greenish soil not found very often.

Floor deposit (Fig. 26)

In the southern part was noted red and red-brownish soil. Furthermore pieces of charcoal were noted and in the area south of the stone construction, ash was noted on the floor. In 1978, in the same area a loose, light reddish-brown soil with few sherds and some small stones among the fallen stones were noted. On the floor, as found in 1978, the ash continued southwards. In the southern part red-brownish with much plaster and some charcoal and many fallen stones; lots of pottery in the upper part of the deposit. Immediately above the floor there were less stones and no plaster but more charcoal and a few bits of kouskouras. There were no obvious signs of the ash continuing, however. Clear spots of ash can be seen on the floor up against 13-Wall 4. The Corridor, in other words, exposed the same traces of being destroyed by fire as noted in Rooms A and C. In most baskets LM IIIB and also some LM IIIA pottery were noted. Furthermore a few LM II, some LM I and a few MM pieces. 11.165 kg of pottery were collected: 24% decorated, 86% kept and 2.1% inventoried. Shapes noted (1971): large and small stirrup jars, decorated and undecorated kylikes, decorated cups and bowls, krater, amphora and a pithos rim.

Comments: The complete footed cup (71-P 0163) may possibly belong to the floor deposit cf. above. Comments on joins: 78-P 0146+ must at some point have been a complete vase connected to the corridor. The only strange join is the one to inside the shaft in Room A. Most of the joins are part of the scatter in the destroyed building, noted in connection with Room A especially. With 82-P 1635 we noted the joins between different LM IIIA:1 pits and since the floor sealed one of those pits the join may be "natural". A sample of lime(?) was collected above the floor.

Pits in and below floor

13-Pit U (Figs. 26-27a, Pls. 36c, 37b)

This, in all probability, was one of the storage pits also discovered elsewhere in the building (cf. the shaft in Room A, above p. 43). A hole had been dug to place the jar 77-P 0876 and the hole was dug somewhat bigger than the jar. Max. body \emptyset of jar is 0.588, while the \emptyset of the pit is 0.55 to 0.75. The bottom of the pit was found *c*. 0.53 below the floor – corresponding to the height of the jar (without tripod legs). Some olive stones were found in the jar together with two pieces of obsidian in a reddish-brown, soft soil with some small stones and some slab stones which may have functioned as a lid for the jar.

The pottery in the pit was mainly LM IIIB, few LM I. 4.700 kg of pottery were collected: 13% decorated, 94% kept and 0.9% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Comments: Both joins are "natural". The pit was probably not the original place for the storage jar, as indicated by its elaborate decoration. It must have found its reused place early in LM IIIB:1 as it was later hidden by the floor of the Corridor. A sample of soil was collected from the pit.




Fig. 27a-b. Corridor/Space I, sections A-A and B-B, cf. Fig. 26.

8-Pit T (Figs. 26, 27b, Pls. 36c, 37b)

The pit was hidden below the curious stone structure up against 18-Wall 2 (*Pl. 35a, b*). When the stone structure was removed the outline of the pit could clearly be seen in the floor (*Figs. 36c, 37a*). The pit is almost circular with a diameter of 0.75-80. The bottom was found a little more than 0.80 below the floor level. There is no mention of a coating of any kind. No finds from this storage pit to reveal its possible function. The pit contained dark reddish-brown, partly greenish, soft soil, some small stones and in the lower part the soil was greenish-brown and sandy. It contained LM IIIA, LM IIIB and few LM I pieces of pottery. 8.250 kg of pottery were collected: 18% decorated, 87% kept and 0.8% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

BONES

Few bones from young and adult *Ovis* and *Sus*, while caprid was only represented by adult animal.

Comments: There was little pottery and few finds for such a large and deep storage pit. The join 71-P 0772 to LM IIIC, Room E is not immediately understandable.



Pit in south corner of Space I (Fig. 26, Pl. 37c)

In a small trial test in the very south corner of Space I where the floor levels were destroyed we came upon a pit within the square 517.2-518.35/701.3-701.8 at levels 9.26 to 8.78. The soil in the pit was loose, brownish with many small stones and sherds. LM IIIB, LM IIIA, LM II and LM I was noted. 1.960 kg of pottery was collected: 14% decorated, 100% kept and 2.1% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

In the area between 516.3-518.5/703.7-704.8 the floor was

missing (only the overlying LM IIIB:2 floor was noted) and instead some loose soil was noted. It proved to be lying on top of an LM IIIA:1 pit, several sherds from which may be included below. The upper part, however, ought to be later than the actual floor of Space I, and the deposit must be considered as one of the latest within LM IIIB:1. It contained mixed brown-greyish earth which turned out to be mainly brown with many pieces of charcoal. The latest pottery was LM IIIB, but the pit also included LM IIIA and a few LM I and MM pieces. Shapes noted (1971): decorated cups and bowls, a krater, undecorated kylikes, a large stirrup jar and a flask. Nothing was weighed.

Comments: All joins are mainly to the same general area. A high percentage of LW for this pit and a lot of decorated pottery were noted. Bones were not collected.

Constructions

In and below the floor (Figs. 26, 27)

It seems as if there might have been repairs to the floor in Space I, as indicated by the triangular floor fragment boarding 15-Wall 2. This, however, is the only place where two floors were noted (with the exception of the blocked doorway, cf. below). Samples of both those floors were kept as AR.

77-AR 010 (*Pl. 239a*): 15-Floor 3: Floor 3 does in fact consist of three layers: two surfaces covered with ash and the latest surface which is rather soft, fine and sandy. Below both layers of ash the soil is relatively hard, fine and sandy with small inclusions and also small carbonized remains. A few worn sherds were embedded. Three largest fragments had Mpd: 0.091-0.102. Th.: upper layer: 0.004; 2nd layer: 0.010-12; 3rd layer: 0.017-20. Could 3rd layer be 15-Floor 4?

77-AR 008 (*Pl. 238d*): 15-Floor 4: The floor consists of a fine, sandy, reddish soil – very hard where there have only been relatively few inclusions. Surface is nice and even and seems to have been treated with something which gives a cream whitish colour. Spots of ash in the "bedding". Th. of the collected pieces: 0.023-37.

During the excavation 15-Floor 4 was described as mainly hard brownish clay with hard brown earth below. The floor is of very hard stamped clay with many sherds and some pebbles and it must be considered a pebble floor. The repair, 15-Floor 3, was noted as a hard yellow-brownish soil mixed with a lot of ash.

The floors of Corridor/Space I were excavated over several years. In the eastern part of the Corridor a light reddishbrown, somewhere greyish, hard soil was noted with few small stones. In the southern part of the Corridor hard, light red-brownish, sandy soil with some charcoal, a few bones and sherds was noted; Here it recalled much of the surface of the street to the south. (p. 121) In the western part of Space I a greyish-brown clay was noted with small lime pieces, some charcoal, while in the northern part a red clay floor was noted with small stones and several traces of charcoal. Below the floors was a soft and brown soil with bigger and smaller stones among each other and a patch with very soft yellowish-brown earth.

The pottery seems mainly to be LM IIIA, but in many baskets LM IIIB pottery was also noted. Furthermore few LM I and MM. 16.125 kg of pottery were collected: 14% decorated, 73% kept and 2.0% inventoried. Shapes noted (1971): decorated cups and bowls, decorated and undecorated kylikes, a tripod cooking pot leg.

Comments: Some of the pieces in the floors may perhaps – as also argued in connection with Room D – be "trodden-down-pieces". All joins are "natural".

The walls (Pls. 36, 37a, 38b-d)

For walls bordering Room D, see 15-Wall 2 and 3 (above p. 68), only note that the door leading into Room D must have been blocked in the LM IIIB:1 phase. For the walls bordering Room E, see Room E below p. 109.

6-Wall 2 (southwestern part): the northeastern part was an LM IIIB:2 construction (GSE III, 40-41) while the southwestern part facing Space I is considered a construction of this period (Pl. 38c, d). Also the bottom of this wall was found 0.10 below the bottom of the northeastern part at height 9.60 which is approximately the same as the floor in the area. The

surface facing the Annex did not have the appearance of a wall, but rather heaped stones which may perhaps indicate that the wall was built up against soil on the northwest side. It was constructed mainly from larger stones (mostly sandstone and a few limestones) and packed with small stones. There were larger stones in the lower course than in the remaining part of the wall. The mortar is described as "grey, clay-like earth". If this wall is correctly interpreted there would have been an opening into the Annex from Space I. There may have been a small bedding below the wall.

13-Wall 4 (Pls. 36b-c, 37a): is a construction of the LM IIIB:1 period. Up to the point of 521/702.15 the wall was going at a right angle to 13-Wall 2. At this point it turned towards the northwest probably to join the southwestern wall of Room E, 13-Wall 2a, at odd angles (Pl. 37a). The southern part of the wall is completely preserved at a length of c. 1.20 while the northern part (on the northeast face) is preserved at a length of 1.15 and the face towards the corridor at 0.9. Only one course of stones was preserved. The bottom of the wall was lying 0.12 to 0.08 higher than the floor which was not recognized below the wall nor in Room U. The construction of the wall on the south side therefore started at a higher level than the corresponding floor. The same is noted with other walls, although not to this extreme. The width of the wall is 0.60 and it is preserved at a height of 0.20-25. The north part was constructed directly upon the LM I, House I wall. The wall is built by mostly unworked stones of different sizes. Apparently it was constructed in the usual sandwich way. The mortar was dark reddish-brown soft with small stones.

18-Wall 2 and 13-Wall 2 (Pls. 36a, c, 37a) could be followed to its full length (in excavated area) of five metres. In the area between 518.7 to 520 there had originally been a door leading into the street, but it had at a certain point been blocked up (Sherds 82-P 1520, 1521). The wall was preserved at a height of c. 0.70 all the way and had the usual width of c. 0.60. Also the bottom of this wall was seen to be a few centimetres above the floor. The construction east of the door is the usual sandwich type while a large, probably reused monolith, forms the base of the wall south of the door (a stone which may have been moved from LM I House I?) It was set upon a row of smaller stones (e.g. Pl. 38b). The door was blocked up by mainly smaller stones. It contained a lot of soil/mortar which was soft, red brown and contained some sand. Below was a small thin level with a hard surface (light red-brown, sandy with some charcoal, few bones and sherds) lying on the floor connecting Street and Corridor. Yet another floor was found below. Both floor fragments were excavated together with floor of the Corridor part. For communication with the Street, see below.

Apparently LM IIIA pottery was the most dominant, but LM IIIB pottery was noted in connection with the walls bordering the street and Room U. Furthermore, some LM I and few MM. 10.045 kg of pottery were collected: 13% decorated, 77% kept and 1.5% inventoried. Shapes noted (1971): decorated and undecorated kylikes, decorated cups and bowls and a large stirrup jar.






ANNEX (Figs. 28-31, Pls. 39a-c)

6-Wall 3 must originally have continued towards the northwest and it must have met 14-Wall 6 at *c*. 514.2/708.7 (see below p. 95). If so, Space I was provided with an Annex, a small square chamber measuring $c. 2 \times 2$. The soil above the floor, in general, is described as a reddish-brown earth *with many big stones* thus very much recalling the layer with stones above Corridor and Rooms A-D. From the architectural setting the construction of the Annex must be part of the building activity following after the LM IIIA:2 building was demolished. In the part excavated *c*. 514.5-515.25/706.8-707.6 a red clay floor was noted at *c*. 9.56. The bottom of 14-Wall 6 was at *c*. 9.61 which is also the top of the foundation stones of the northwestern wall of LM I House I, Room B, meaning that the floor of the Annex would probably have been sloping slightly towards the opening from where there was step of c. 0.12 to the floor of Space I. Because of the Turkish chalk groove and the Venetian walls (W1-008 and 009) very little was in fact found in this room.

Constructions




Fig. 30b. Annex, section of 14-Wall 6, southwestern side.

For 6-Wall 2 see Corridor/Space I (above p. 79). For 14-Wall 4 see Room C (above p. 62). 14-Wall 6 (*Fig. 30a-b, Pl. 39a, c*) is preserved at a length of 1.15, a width of 0.50 and height of 0.67 (2-3 courses). The wall is not built in the usual regular way; here mainly unworked limestone, one schist stone and one reused ashlar block. The mortar is light brown earth and

clay with many small stones. The more regular and thinner part of the wall is the one facing the Annex (*Fig. 30b*) being in line with the other walls. Interesting and noteworthy is that one of the stones of the wall, as far as we can judge from the photographs, (the stone was not kept) must be a broken anchor. Most clearly seen on *Pl. 39c*. The anchor may be conjecturally restored from different photographs (*Fig. 31*) and the length can be estimated to *c.* 0.60 and with an average thickness of *c.* 0.25 (perhaps more) while the hole has a diameter of 0.20-25. The anchor is of limestone.

The soil in and below the floor is not described. Surely few pieces LM IIIB above the floor while LM IIIB is doubtable in and below the floor and in the wall. 0.800 kg of pottery was collected (only 1977): 6% decorated, 88% kept and 0% inventoried. Shapes noted (1971): decorated cup/bowl, decorated and undecorated kylix. Nothing was inventoried.

Comments: Too little to be of value; very little decorated pottery was noted.

SPACE G (Figs. 32-36, Pls. 40-44b)

In the LM IIIB:1 period this seems not to have been a room, but rather an open space. Within the square 508-509/710-711 a fragment of a wall was found, 33-Wall 2, facing Space G. This wall did not continue towards the northeast but must have formed a corner in *c*. 509/711 with a wall running to-

wards the northwest, which means that Space G must have been a kind of L-shaped space. This was also confirmed by the fact that all five floor levels of the space was found within the square 509-510/711.5-712.5 - precisely in the spot where 33-Wall 2 would have been, if it had continued towards the northeast. Space G would thus have had a length of at least 6.70 while the width in the southwestern part was 3.20 and in the northern part not less than 3.60. This indicates that Space G would have covered an area of more than 23 m². As mentioned previously the space had five successive floors (only recognized in Trs. 23 and 33) all sloping strongly towards the southwest (almost 0.15 on 3.5 metres). In the succeeding LM IIIB:2 habitation the area was rebuilt and the floor was levelled to be straight in connection with the construction of Room K in the area. This is also the reason for considering that the hearth around 510.5/710.5 belongs to LM IIIB:2 (cf. GSE III, 48-51) although the levels indicate that it might have belonged to LM IIIB:1.

East of 510 and south of 710 none of the five floors were noted during the excavation, but excavated as one unit and are here considered with taking out the upper floor, 23-Floor 7, as is a small cleaning operation in 2001. In the area 710-711 only the lower floor (23-Floor 11) was noted and the deposit above this is here considered with taking out 23-Floor 8. North of 711 the area was apparently much disturbed by both modern walls and later pits and nothing from the 1970 excavation can with certainty be attributed to Space G. Stratigraphically Space G sealed various LM IIIA:1 and LM II deposits.




Fig. 33. Space G, section A-A; cf. Figs. 32 and 34.

The pithos (Pl. 42b). At the centre in 510.4/708.6 the lower part of a pithos (77-P 1397) was found. It was not standing on any floor (the underlying LM I floor [23-Floor 12] was found c. 0.30 below the bottom of the pithos). In the interior of the pithos, all the way at the bottom, LM IIIB pottery was discovered. Obviously it had been dug into one of the floors of Space G. To judge from the stratigraphy it seems that the pithos had become disused in connection with the creation of the dump found between the floors (Fig. 33). If there was a dump on 23-Floor 11 it seems that the pithos was connected to the original floor. We have at least three more instances from Building 1 with sunk shafts in the floors: Room A, north corner (see above, p. 43) which also became disused before the disuse of the room and which also had got a dump on top of it, the northeastern corner of the Corridor (see above, p. 75) where a large decorated jar had been sunk into the floor and

finally the shaft covered by a stone construction in the Corridor (see above p. 75). These shafts probably had some connection with storage. Sunken pithoi are known from Zakros. In the first two cases the shafts were in the corner of a room – while our pithos was placed up against the wall. To place the pithos it seems that a shaft was dug and that small pebbles and some loose soil were laid at the bottom before the pithos was sunk down and loose soil was packed around it.

In upper floor, 23-Floor 7 (*Figs. 32-33, Pls. 15c:8, 17b:7-8, 17c:12, 40a*)

23-Floor 7 (*Pl. 17c:12*) consisted of a 0.01-4 thick layer of *kouskouras*. The floor is exceptionally good quality and hard, and the sherds collected probably belong to the underlying levelling deposit. It was excavated at levels 10.19 to 10.15 (in centre of Tr. 23). The same solid *kouskouras* floor was not noted neither in Tr. 14 (although it is clearly seen in the scarps) nor in Sc. 3/14 and one must suppose that it was partly destroyed, partly reused in connection with the overlying LM IIIB:2 floor of Room K, i.e. only bits and pieces may have survived in Tr. 14 and Sc. 3/14 where "lumps of clay" were noted. Around 509-510/711.5-712.5 no *kouskouras* was noted, but instead a hard-packed, beaten earth floor consisting of light brown soil with a few small stones. Here the floor was 0.02-5 thick and excavated at levels 10.16 to 10.14/10.11.

In Tr. 14 a deposit started at approximately the level of 23-Floor 7 and it stopped approximately of the level of 23-Floor 11 (*Pl. 15c:9-10*). This deposit is here considered together with taking out the upper floor since the lower floors were not recognized in this area. The soil is described as redbrown, thin and dry with small stones. In the northern part many pieces of clay and charcoal were noted. In certain areas there were quite a lot of stones. After some depth the soil was browner. The deposit contained mainly LM IIIB sherds, but also some LM IIIA and a few MM/LM I pieces. 15.112 kg of pottery were collected: 14% decorated, 51% kept and 1.0% inventoried. Shapes were not counted in 1977 and no shapes could be counted in 1987 and 2001.

Comments: Four objects were actually found on the upper floor of Space G, but they were recorded in connection with the excavation of the LM IIIB:2 layer above the floor. The objects were an almost completely preserved bone amulet (87-MISC 003, *Fig. 32* [185], *Pl. 239c:4*) found together with a fragmentarily preserved bronze pin (87-M 005, *Fig. 32* [184], *Pl. 239c:2*). Furthermore, two pieces of obsidian were found on the floor (87-OB 010, *Fig. 32* [186] and 87-OB 011, *Fig. 32* [187]). For further details of these four objects see *GSE* III, 52 and fig. 11. There is no immediate explanation for the wide scatter of sherds in this deposit – undoubtedly due to human activity. Concerning the joins to 77-P 0918 most are "natural".

Dump below upper floor (*Figs. 32-33, Pls. 15c:9, 40b-c*)

This dump was identified in both Tr. 23 and 14. In Tr. 14 it was found above the broken rim of the sunk pithos and was not connected to any floor (since they were not recognized). In Tr. 23 the dump, excavated at levels from 10.16/10.04 to 9.94/9.91, was going almost all the way down to the first floor, 23-Floor 11, of the space and it was sealed below the upper floor (23-Floor 7). Here parts of the dump, however, were also sealed by the floors 8, 9 and 10 for which reason it has been interpreted as a dump rather than a pit. A dump created at the time when the pithos became disused is very similar to the situation described in Room A where a later floor partly covered the dump above the disused shaft (cf. above p. 41). In a similar stratigraphic position we find a small pit in Sc 3/14 (3/14-Pit B) which was probably also part of the dump.

The soil in this dump is variously described: from yellowish-reddish to brown-yellowish, but always as loose and filled with many small stones and sherds. The dump contained mainly LM IIIB pottery, but also some LM IIIA, few MM/ LM I and one or two LM II pieces. The two inventoried Geometric sherds are due to a mixture of labels at a late point. 55.620 kg of pottery were collected: 9% decorated, 70% kept and 1.2% inventoried. Shapes counted (1987): 1 large stirrup jar, 1 decorated kylix and 2 footed cups.

Comments: The most exciting find was the sealing with the seal impressions perhaps indicating how sealing practise and seal-use continued in LM IIIB, even though the seal might be of LM I date. Parallels for such a use are found at Knossos and Pylos. The type of sealing is definitely not known in the Minoan Linear A administration. Except for the join to LM IIIC, Space O¹, patio (77-P 0449) in a later context all the joins seem to be connected (with the possible exception of 77-P 0533+) to Space G and may thus be considered "natural".

In 23-Floor 8 (*Figs. 32-33, Pls. 17c:13, in 18b:13, 41a*)

Below the upper floor a relatively thin beaten earth floor was found, 23-Floor 8, with spots of red clay excavated at levels 10.23/10.01 to 10.19/10.01. In the floor many sherds were noted. Around 509-510/711.5-712.5 it was a hard packed beaten earth floor consisting of light brown soil with few small stones. Here it was 0.03-4 thick and excavated at levels 10.14/10.11 down to 10.10/10.08. At *c*. 708-709 an ashy area with bits of charcoal was noted. Otherwise a thin layer of burnt red soil. The levelling deposit for this floor was thin, light brown, not very hard and with little sand. In the floor mainly LM IIIB pottery was found, but also some LM IIIA was noted. Furthermore MM/LM I and few pieces LM II. 9.597 kg of pottery were collected: 12% decorated, 71% kept and 3.4% inventoried. Shapes counted (1987): 1 small stirrup jar and 1 cooking dish rim fragment.

Comments: Worthy of note is the seal stone found in the floor of the LM IIIB:1 period when administration by seal was still happening. Most joins are "natural". The one to an LM IIIA:1 pit (78-P 0230) indicate joins between the LM IIIA:1 pit found immediately below Space G and the one further north.

In 23-Floor 9/10 (*Figs. 32-34, Pls. 17c:14-16, in 18a:11, 41b-c*)

These floors were, as mentioned above, only separated in Trs. 23 (Pl. 17c:14-16) and 33. There were two floors with a levelling deposit or more likely a floor deposit to 23-Floor 11 below. Of these the most remarkable deposit was excavated around 509/706.6 where 11 small stones were lying on 23-Floor 11. The soil which covered these stones differed from the remaining "floor deposit". The stones were lying in an almost straight row at a length of c. 0.75 and were of almost equal size (Ø c. 0.10), (Fig. 34, Pl. 41d). The very tempting interpretation of these finds is that a small loom had been standing up against the wall in this area. None of the stones, alas, were collected. For safety this deposit is here included as levelling. It is tempting in connection with this to recall one almost complete and one fragmentary terracotta loom weight in the dump (above, p. 86) most likely to have been created when 23-Floor 11 became disused.

23-Floor 9: In Tr. 23 excavated at levels from 10.18/9.98 to 10.17/9.98, where it consisted of yellow to dark yellowish soil with little charcoal, many small stones and one small slab stone at *c*. 508.2/706.8. Many sherds were embedded in the floor which was partly destroyed around 509.1/706.9. The floor went further towards southwest than the floors above. Around 509-510/711.5-712.5 was a beaten earth floor consisting of light brown soil with some small stones, charcoal and ashes. Here it was 0.05 thick and excavated at levels from 10.10/10.08 to 10.05/10.03.

23-Floor 10: In Tr. 23 the floor was hard brown-reddish with few small stones. Around 509-510/711.5-712.5 it was a beaten earth floor consisting of light brown soil with some small stones (more than found in Floor 7). It was c. 0.04 thick and excavated at levels 10.05/10.03 to 10.01/9.99. One small deposit went through the underlying 23-Floor 11 close to 14-Wall 3a.

The soil is not homogeneous: in the eastern part we found medium soft, not too dark brownish soil with some pebbles, little sand almost no charcoal bits. Towards west, the soil was dark red-brownish with few bits of charcoal and some smaller stones and it contained spots of red clay and many sherds. Around 509-510/711.5-712.5 the levelling deposit (or floor deposit for 23-Floor 11) consisted of a relatively loose light brown soil, some small stones, charcoal and ashes. The deposit was excavated at levels 10.01/9.99 to 9.93/9.92 which was the top of the underlying 33-Floor 8 (=23-Floor 11). Included in the catalogue below is also a deposit which may have been a floor deposit for floor 11: it contained relatively fat red to slightly brownish soil with a few small stones and very few small bits of charcoal. Deposit above supposed loom: dark red to greyish, relatively soft and fine, with small stones.

The deposits contained mainly, it seems, LM IIIA, but some LM IIIB is still noted. Furthermore MM/LM I and a few pieces of EM were found. LM IIIB was *only* noted in connection with floors 9/10 and the real levelling, *not* with the supposed floor deposit. 19.975 kg of pottery were collected: 15% decorated, 82% kept and 3.4% inventoried. Shapes counted: 1 large decorated stirrup jar, 2 undecorated bowls, 2 footed cups and 1 rim frg. of a cooking dish.







In 23-Floor 11 (*Figs. 33-35, Pls. 17c:17-19, 18a:14, 15, 24, 18b:10, 41d, 42a, b*)

The original floor of Space G was found in all the undisturbed parts of Trs. 23 and 33 and patches were noted in Sc. 3/14. A small pit, 23-Pit I (*Fig. 33*), in the southern part which was cut into the levelling deposit may possibly be connected to the use of the floor since the floor was not clearly defined above the pit. Also the pithos and the packing around the pithos are considered together with this deposit.

23-Floor 11 consisted both of a pebble floor (north of 708.8 covered by a thin layer of kouskouras) and in the southern part and north of 709.5 of a beaten earth floor. The soil of the floor is described as hard, reddish to light brown with charcoal bits and small pebbles; towards the south fatter red soil. In Tr. 23 it was excavated from 9.96 to 9.93. North of 709.5 the floor was 0.05-12 thick and excavated at levels 9.95/9.98 to 9.83. 23-Pit I, excavated from 9.83 to 9.48, consisted of dark brown-reddish, loose soil with some pebbles, small stones, and some bits of charcoal. In the levelling deposit the pottery, (which is here kept together with the pottery from in the floor, being of the same construction phase) was noted to be light brown-reddish, relatively soft soil with pieces of charcoal and small pebbles, while in the southern part the soil is darker, almost greyish, with small stones (\emptyset : 0.05-20) and larger spots of charcoal. Below 14-Wall 3b we found yellowish hard soil with a few charcoal bits and a few small stones. The packing around the pithos is yellow-red-brown, dry and rather hard. North of 709.5 this deposit consisted of a medium hard reddish-brown soil with very few small stones and it was excavated at levels 9.83 to 9.76/9.61.

Apparently LM IIIA is the latest pottery. A few doubtable LM IIIB sherds were preliminarily noted, however, it could not be confirmed when the pottery was studied. Furthermore a few sherds of LN, EM, MM/LM I and LM I date were found. 32.035 kg of pottery were collected: 8% decorated, 62% kept and 2.5% inventoried. Shapes counted (1987 and 2001): 6 undecorated goblets, 1 undecorated kylix, 1 undecorated bowl, 1 undecorated jar, 4 conical cups, 1 decorated stirrup jar and 1 flask.








Fig. 36a. Space G, section of 3/14-Wall 2, southwestern side.

BONES

Many bones; one from adult *Ovis* and *Capra*, adult and young caprid, *Sus* and *Bos*. Furthermore a bone from an unidentifiable bird was noted. On one S.pula from *Sus* was noted clear cut marks, and there was noted a Metacarpal-bone from a sucking-calf.

SHELLS

1 Spondylus - lower, fresh, L 0.0695. 1 Mytilus - frg.

Comments: The LM I plaster fragments must belong to the LM I, House IV, Room G. A sample of charcoal (87-Sample 003) was collected for analysis.

Constructions

The walls (Figs. 34-36, Pls. 42c-d, 43a-d, 44a-b)

The southwestern wall of the space is not identified as it lies outside the excavated area.

33-Wall 2 (*Pl. 42d*): of this wall only three stones in one course have been identified within the area 508-509/710-711. As argued above we are obviously dealing with the corner of a wall. The wall fragment could be followed in a length of *c*. 0.60. Width is unmeasurable.

3/14-Wall 2 (*Fig. 36a-b, Pls. 42c, 43a-b*) has been completely excavated. It was preserved to a length of *c.* 2.25 and a width of 0.55-60. At the east corner of the space the wall was preserved (one stone) at the height of 0.57 while the remaining part was preserved only at a height of *c.* 0.20-25. The northern part of the wall, i.e. in Tr. 3 had disappeared due to later activities in the area. At the bottom of the wall – as a wall foundation – a 0.05-15 thick packing of small stones was

found. On top of that, were rather large stones going the full width of the wall (0.55), on top of which smaller stones were found. The preserved part of this wall was not of the usual sandwich type. The mortar was mainly hard brown-reddish soil mixed with clay; in places mixed with a looser greyish earth. By and large the bottom of this wall started on the level of the original floor and in this respect it reminds us most of the remaining walls of this phase.

14-Wall 3a+b, is preserved at a length of 8.1 and with a width of 0.55-65. The wall is in the southern part destroyed by W1-018 (see *GSE* I, 160-163). It consisted of two parts. The southern (unexcavated) part, 14-Wall 3a, which neighbours Room C, and the northern (excavated) part, 14-Wall 3b, which neighbours Room H and which is of a different construction and with a slightly different orientation.

14-Wall 3a (*Figs. 18, 34-35, Pl. 43c-d*) is a new wall of the LM IIIB:1 period. It is preserved at a length of 6.6 and a width of *c*. 0.60-65. From the side of Space G it is only preserved in one to two courses above the floor, while from the side of Room C it is preserved to a height of more than one metre. It is constructed with the usual sandwich technique and with the part facing Room C without a wall foundation, while the part facing Space G (because of its much higher floor level) had some wall foundation (*Fig. 35b*) meaning that most of the wall facing Room C was only a "half-wall". To a large extent it was constructed with reused stones.

14-Wall 3b (Pl. 44a-b): turned more E-W than the southern part and it was not a very well constructed wall. It was preserved in a length of 1.70 and a width of 0.55-60, and it consisted of two courses of rather large stones; the tops of which were noted at 10.40 and 10.31, while the bottom was at 10.06 and 10.00 respectively. The construction technique appears to be slightly different from the usual in that it consisted of parallel rows of stones with a few going all the way across the wall. The mortar was a loose dark grey-brown soil with very many small stones, i.e. not the usual good, solid mortar. The wall at this point seemed to have its bottom at the same level as 3/14-Wall 2. Below the wall and above the LM I House IV, Room H different soils were found - probably connected to the LM II/IIIA:1 deposits. The wall itself may at some point have been blocking up a passage between Space G and Room H in the LM IIIB:1 period.

The pottery from the excavated walls, 14-Wall 3b and 3/14-Wall 2 was mainly of LM IIIA date with a few pieces of LM IIIB, MM/LM I and LM I. 18.410 kg of pottery were collected: 8% decorated, 53% kept and 0.2% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Comments: The three inventoried sherds are from a cleaning of 3/14 Wall 2, and need not all be from inside the wall. The number of decorated sherds is below average – not unexpected being mainly from constructions. It may be worthy of note that as much as 13.750 kg of pottery were collected from actually inside the two, small, excavated wall fragments (to which may be added 4.660 kg from the cleaning of the walls).

With the possible exception of the deposit above 23-Floor 11 and the finds on 23-Floor 7 (cf. above p. 83) there were no floor deposits in this space. The development seems to be the construction of a relatively good floor (23-Floor 11) in connection with which the pithos also seems to have been sunk. Undoubtedly this happened during the end of LM IIIA. This lower floor seems to have been in use until some time in LM IIIB:1 when the pithos became disused and a dump was heaped upon it. Partly covering this dump we find the last four floors, the latest of which sealed the dump and which was perhaps partly reused in the northern part during the LM IIIB:2 (Room K) phase when the floor did no longer slope towards southwest.




Fig. 37. LM IIIB:1 Room H, plan of constructions and distribution of finds.

ROOM H (*Figs. 37-38a-b*, *Pls. 18c:5 and 6 upper part, 19a:19 to the right of 4/5-Wall 3, 19b:6, 44c-d, 45a*)

Room H lies in an area very much disturbed by the Venetian building activities: the east corner by a well and all the western part by wall foundations, a Turkish chalk groove and a rubbish? pit (see GSE I, 160-166). No floor was identified during the excavation, although a kind of surface must have existed at c. 10.06 to 10.11. The argument goes as follows: excavating the Sc. 4/5 in 517-518/711-712 a layer of fallen stones was noted (recalling that above Rooms A-D) which stopped a little above 10.01. In the section Pl. 18c:5 a layer of stones with the bottom approximately at the level of those excavated in the scarp is drawn. The bottom of the preserved part of the walls 4-Wall 7 and 4/5-Wall 3 were found at c. 10.06, indicating the usual LM IIIA:2/B:1 building technique. Finally, it should be noted that the top of the southwestern wall of LM I House I, Room A was at level 9.94, below which the supposed floor of Room H could not have gone. It should also be noted that in the sections drawn in the undisturbed parts of the room (Pls. 18c, 19a) no difference was noted in the soil,

although the excavation in Sc. 4/5 proved it to be there. Most importantly, in the 1970 excavation (Tr. 4) there was a clear change of baskets and levels at the height 10.01 and a small *c*. 0.07 thick deposit was excavated separately below this.

The structures in the western part of the room are very uncertain, because of the Venetian walls. 6-Wall 3 (destroyed by the chalk groove, cf. *GSE* I, 132) probably continued towards the northwest in line of 3/14-Wall 2 (cf. above, p. 81). Surely, during the original phase of Room E there was no wall at the area 516/708.25. The bottom of the stones in this part was at 9.84 and a large flat stone was found at 9.59 indicating that a couple of steps led from Room E to the floor of Room H. For the same reason it may be suspected that the room was not an open space. Furthermore it can be conjectured that there was some kind of connection between Space G and Room H: 14-Wall 6 (*c.* 512.75/708.25) as it had its top far above the floor of Space G and Room H while the bottom was only a little above the Annex (cf. pp. 81-82). This would leave a small vestibule-like space around 513/709 and whether there was a door or just an opening into Space G from the "vestibule" remains uncertain. Probably when Room H became disused the 14-Wall 3b was constructed (see above, Space G, p. 94). At the same time the opening by the steps into Room E became blocked up. Much of the above is conjectural, but it is almost the only way the architectural remains can be explained. If correctly interpreted the room measures $3.75/4.00 \times 2.85/2.95$ and the "vestibule" 1.75×0.9 – all together c. 13 m².

Also it should be noted that this may have been one way to access the building – through the open Space G, into the "vestibule" Room H and down into Room E.

Above floor (Figs. 37-38)

In this room we cannot speak of a real floor deposit since no

floor was identified, but very likely the kylix 71-P 0596 found among the stones may have belonged to the floor. Seven baskets were excavated above the level of the supposed floor. The soil is variously described as reddish-brown to red. In all baskets LM IIIA and LM IIIB were noted and very little LM I pottery was noted. Nothing was weighed. Shapes noted (1971): amphora, decorated and undecorated cups and bowls, undecorated goblet, large and small stirrup jars, undecorated and decorated kylikes, conical cup, flask, krater and decorated jug.



Constructions (Figs. 37-38)

The floor was not identified unless it is the one described in 1970 as brownish-red and greyish-brown with pieces of mudbrick in it.

6-Wall 4: See under Room E, below pp. 107-108.

6-Wall 3: Disappeared in this room.

4-Wall 7 (*Pl. 44c*) was preserved in the northeastern part at the length of c. 1.20 and a width of c. 0.55; probably only one course of stones preserved.

4/5-Wall 3 (*Pl. 44d*) was preserved at a length of almost two metres, a width of 0.50-55 in two courses to a height of 0.20-25. It consisted mainly of smaller unworked stones laid in the usual sandwich type with the larger stones facing away from the room. No traces of clay lining were noted. The bottom of the wall was found approximately at level with the supposed floor. There exists no description of mortar.

14-Wall 6: see Space I, Annex, pp. 81-82.

In both baskets LM IIIA and LM IIIB pottery were found together with a few pieces MM. Nothing was weighed. No pottery was inventoried. Shapes noted (1970 and 1971): decorated and undecorated kylikes, undecorated goblet, decorated cups and bowls, a flask and a krater.

Levelling deposit (Figs. 37-38, Pls. 18c:5 and 6 lower part, 45a)

Below the level of the supposed floor seven baskets of pottery were excavated as levelling deposit for the floor. Most of this, however, probably belongs with the underlying LM IIIA:2 deposits noted further north. A concentration of conical cups is seen on *Fig. 37B, Pl. 45a.* Brown and reddish-brown earth in the western part and red in the eastern part. LM IIIA noted in all baskets. Furthermore EM II, MM IIA, some MM/ LM I and few LM II. Nothing was weighed. Shapes noted (1971): decorated and undecorated cups, bowls, kylikes, goblets, large and small stirrup jars, flask, 5 tripod cooking pot legs and a pithos rim.

Very few bones from young and adult caprid and *Sus* were collected as well as one bone from *Bos*.

Comments: The concentration of conical cups around *c*. 515.5/709.8/-9.88 could not be connected to any architecture. Three of the joins are to LM IIIA:1 deposits in the same area, i.e. "natural". There is a remarkable drop of LW compared to the deposits above the supposed floor – so remarkable that it must again be taken as an indication for two different lev-

els. As decorated bowls and small stirrup jars are among the noted sherds the deposit definitely belongs to LM IIIB:1, but as with the nearby underlying rubbish deposit, the pottery mainly seems to belong to the LM IIIA:2 period.




Fig. 39. LM IIIB:1 Room E, plan of upper floor and distribution of finds.

ROOM E (*Figs. 39-45, Pls. 19b:11/12, 19c below 7-8, 20c:25, 45b-51c*)

Room E has two phases within the LM IIIB:1 period, i.e. two floors with hearths where the later floor mainly consists of repairs of the original floor. The construction of LM IIIB:1 Room E is probably contemporary with the new walls in Rooms A-D – with a floor sloping slightly towards the south from c. 9.54 to 9.48 and with the construction of the first circular hearth in the level of the floor. This original floor was in most places a good pebble floor, but best preserved in the northern part. At some point a new floor and a new hearth were built on top of the original construction (Pl. 45d). The hearth became larger, was raised a few centimetres above the floor and was apparently of a better quality. The corresponding floor, however, was not found everywhere and is more likely to be considered repairs to the original one. Both these phases belong within the LM IIIB:1 phase. In LM IIIB:2 (GSE III, 24-34) a new floor and a new hearth which covered all the old constructions were laid.

Another architectural change which should be noted is the blocking up of the supposed opening/steps leading to Room H (cf. above, p. 95). When this happened is uncertain, but surely before the LM IIIB:2 phase. It is probable that the yellow clay lining noted on 6-Wall 4 and 6-Wall 3 (*Fig. 44, Pl. 45b-c*) was put on the walls in connection with the blocking up of the door. Originally there seem to have been a whitish plaster on the wall (*Pl. 45b*).

In the two LM IIIB:1 floors several pits were noted which had been sealed by the LM IIIB:2 floor. They seem to be younger than the pebble floor which was broken/destroyed by the pits (*Pl. 46a*). Also, one of the pits (D) cut the upper LM IIIB:1 hearth and should therefore be connected to the period between the disuse in LM IIIB:1 and reuse in LM IIIB:2. This pit may also explain the joining sherds between the upper LM IIIB:1 and the IIIB:2 hearth (see below).

Except for the southern part of 13-Wall 2a, the room is roughly rectangular and measures (internally) 7.0-6.6 \times 4.5-3.5 with the hearth placed in the centre. Thus, the floor of the room covers an area of *c*. 31,5 m². A good threshold connecting the room to Corridor/Space I was preserved (*Pls. 46a, 51a-c*) and there may have been communication with Room U where 13-Wall 6 + 9-Wall 4 is destroyed. If so, it would – like the door to Corridor/Space I – be placed in the central cross axis of the room.

In upper floor (Figs. 39-40, Pl. 46a-c)

The most spectacular in the last LM IIIB:1 phase was the hearth (*Fig. 39, Pls. 46a-c*). It had a diameter of at least 2.05 and was slightly destroyed in the eastern and western parts.

Room E

It was raised c. 0.04 above the surrounding floor. It contained a small levelling deposit above the lower hearth and floor, and above that a bedding of broken potsherds (many from pithoi) (*Pl. 46c*) which was covered with a hard plaster. The surface of the hearth was, in the central part, burnt black. Furthermore it had an L-shaped groove in the surface (*Pl. 46b*). The groove had a width of c. 0.02 and a depth of 0.009-16. A sample of the hearth is preserved (cf. 73-TC 045 [260] below, *Pl. 241d*) What is registered in the catalogue is only from constructions i.e. in and below floor and hearth down to original construction. In the southern part the floor was not so clear (three sherds from this area: 73-P 0627-0628, 0886). The sherds 73-P 0510 and 0610-0611 are from the canonic floor while the remaining are from the hearth and the bedding of the hearth. The floor is described as a red and brown clay floor no mention of pebbles. In most baskets LM IIIB or just LM III pottery were noted; furthermore there were very few

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


Fig. 40a-b. Room E, sections A-A and B-B; cf. Figs. 39 and 41.

pieces of EM and MM. Nothing was weighed. Shapes noted (1971): decorated and undecorated kylikes, decorated cups and bowls. Shapes counted (1973): 1 small stirrup jar, 6 conical cups, 3 rim fragments of pithoi, and 2 legs of tripod storage jars.

Comments: The pithos fragments are all from the bedding of the hearth. For the joins between hearths: see *GSE* III, 34. The other join is "natural". Note the high percentage of pithos fragments from hearth. No bones were collected. The small LM IIIB:2 intrusion might have derived from not cleaning the LM IIIB:2 pit well enough.

In lower floor (Figs. 40-41, Pl. 47a-e)

The original floor of the room was a hard, red-brownish to grey-reddish and very well-constructed pebble floor, best preserved in the northern and northwestern part (*Pl. 47a*). From the 1972 description especially, it appears that small stones were also found below the floor indicating a construct-ed bedding for the floor. In several cases much ash was noted on the floor, mainly close to the hearth.

In the position 517.5/708.15 c. 0.60 from 6-Wall 4 a large limestone (73-S 287) was set in the floor (*Pl. 46a, 47b-c*) with a cone-shaped groove in it. This groove has a depth of 0.08. The surface of the stone was very worn and so was the surface of the groove – but more worn in the upper than in the lower part. The hole itself was rather rounded in the bottom. Other stones like this have been found in contemporary

buildings (see below p. 263) and they have been interpreted as a potter's wheel pivot. Apart from this, supporting evidence for pottery making in the room was not found, on the other hand, it would not necessarily be expected with the thin floor levels.

In the original phase it seems certain that Room E must have communicated with Room H via a few steps in the northwestern corner (*Pl. 45c*). Also, the door leading into Corridor/Space I was functioning (*Pl. 51a-c*), as may also have been a door into Room U. Several pits (see below) had destroyed the floor which was not very well-defined in the southern part. Throughout the room the floor was sloping *c*. 0.06 from north to south at levels 9.56 to 9.50.

In the centre of the room we found the lower original hearth which was completely preserved and with a diameter of 1.80 (Pl. 47d). It differed from the other two in that it was not raised above the level of the pebble floor but, on the contrary, had its centre 0.06 below the level of the floor. Apart from this, it was constructed like the others with a bedding of broken potsherds covered by a hard, brown, clay-like soil and finally coated with plaster or a plaster-like substance. Not many traces of fire on this hearth. Samples of the hearth were preserved (cf. below 73-TC 046 [264], *Pl. 241f*).

In most baskets LM IIIA was noted and in a few also LM IIIB pottery; furthermore little MM, LM I, and LM II. 0.745 kg of pottery was collected (1974). 10% decorated, 80% kept and 1.9% inventoried. Shapes noted (1971): decorated cups and bowls, undecorated goblets, decorated and undecorated kylikes, large and small stirrup jars, krater, incense burner. Shapes counted (1973 and 1974): 1 decorated kylik, 3 undecorated kylikes, 12 conical cups, 2 legs of tripod cooking pots, 1 undecorated goblet and 1 tripod storage jar leg.



BONES

Only very few bones were collected in 1977 and they were all unidentifiable.

Comments: All joins here seem to be more or less "natural" coming from the same general area and to some extent belonging to the LM IIIA:1 scatter in southern pits. Compared with other constructions this floor and hearth contained a surprising amount of LM IIIB:1 sherds.

Pits in floor (*Figs. 40-41*, *Pls. 46a*, 47*d-e*, 48*c*)

The original pebble floor was destroyed at several places by later pits which, however, were covered by the LM IIIB:2 phase of the floor. There were two smaller "depressions" in the northwestern part, the easternmost with three large flat stones (Pl. 46a). Northwest of the hearth was Pit I/C with one (not inventoried) intrusive Classical sherd, otherwise LM IIIA and B (Pls. 46a, 47e). To the east of the hearth were two pits: Pit D which destroyed the upper LM IIIB:1 hearth, thus being later than the hearth, and Pit E up against 9-Wall 1a, starting approximately at the level of the lower, original floor (Figs. 40b, 41). In the southeastern corner was one large shallow Pit F which may have been partly covered by the original floor, which was poorly preserved in this area. Pit F is the one which destroyed the northeastern wall of the LM IIIA:2 Space E, 9-Wall 14 (Pl. 8). If 9-Wall 3 at some point had continued westwards - as this seems likely from its plan and stones sticking into Room E (*Pls. 46a* and 48c-d) – this part was probably destroyed by Pit F. To the west of the hearth was another pit called Lakkos. Also, this pit started on the level of the pebble floor (which was not defined here) and it was covered by the LM IIIB:2 floor and partly cut by an LM IIIB:2 pit. Below, the pits have been treated together having approximately the same stratigraphy. In 1977, in the area where we suspect a door/opening between E and U, a small pit was found, 13-Pit O which may be part of these pits, as it started approximately at the level of the lower floor at 9.46. Inventoried from this pit is 77-P 0687 and 77-P 1613. Soil: Pits I/C, D and E: mainly loose brownish soil.; Lakkos: looser brownish-greyish earth; Pit F: brownish soft with many small stones; 13-Pit O: dark reddish-brown, soft, sandy soil with some small stones.

Apparently the pits contained mainly LM IIIA and some LM I with few earlier and a few LM IIIB sherds. 6. 658 kg of pottery were collected (1974). 13% decorated, 100% kept and 1.5% inventoried. Shapes counted (1973+1974): 13 undecorated kylikes, 1 undecorated jug, 2 undecorated cups, 1 undecorated bowl, 23 conical cups, 5 tripod cooking pot legs,

1 miniature vase, 6 undecorated goblets, 2 decorated cups, 3 kraters, 6 tripod storage jar legs and 4 footed cups.



Comments on joins: Nothing was inventoried from Pit D and from Pit E comes only a fragmentary conical cup (73-P 0495). Five of the seven joins from the remaining pits go to LM IIIA:1 pits to the south and east of Room E and one join to the underlying LM IIIA:2 deposits. There is still a relatively high percentage of LW.

Extension (Figs. 42, 43a-b, Pls. 46a, 48a, 49a-f)




Fig. 45a. Room E, section of 9-Wall 4, northwestern side.

The reconstruction of the eastern part of Room E is conjectural. In the LM IIIB:1 period we believe that it consisted of a northern part with 9-Wall 1a and 9-Wall 2a and a southern part with 9-Wall 2b, 9-Wall 3 and 9-wall 4. This southern part is interpreted as a recess in the eastern part of Room E, the floor of which was destroyed in connection with the blocking up of the recess in LM IIIB:2. The slightly oblique 9-Wall 2a would instead seem to fit with the orientation of the LM IIIB:2 settlement, Space P (cf. GSE III, 42-47, figs. 8 and 45-46). The uniformity of the soil and wall constructions, however, seems to indicate that it is an LM IIIB:1 construction. In both the northern and southern area c. 1/2 a metre was excavated between the walls. The soil is, in both areas, described as red and reddish-brown in the upper layer in the southern area - probably all the same.

In all baskets except one, LM IIIB pottery was noted and in all, except one, also LM IIIA. A few later sherds were also noted. Nothing was weighed. Shapes counted (1973): 1 large stirrup jar, 1 decorated kylix, 1 undecorated kylix, 1 undecorated bowl, 15 conical cups, 3 undecorated goblets, 2 decorated cups and 4 footed cups.

Although, in some cases these were mixed with the underlying LM IIIA deposits and with the LM IB destruction level as is clearly the case with the 1972 material and also clearly seen in the soil. It consisted of "mainly fallen mud-brick", "hard red clay mixed with loose earth and stones", "hard yellow-reddish earth", "loose brown earth mixed with red mud-brick" and "hard red clay with many stones in the west part".

Comments: Some of the small finds may – like the pottery – belong either to the LM IIIA:2 deposits or to the LM IB destruction level. The joins are all "natural". There is still a relatively high percentage of LW. No bones collected.

The walls (Figs. 40-45, Pls. 46a, 47b, 48-51c)

Of the walls connected to Room E only the northwestern wall, 6-Wall 4, can be said with absolute certainty to belong to the room from its construction till the possible reuse in Geometric times. The northeastern walls, 9-Walls 1a, 2a and 3 are a curious double construction which fits very well into the IIIB:2 architecture (cf. *GSE* III, 44), but the original planning of which seems uncertain.

6-Wall 4 was originally 4.80 long (3.10 preserved). It was




Fig. 45b. Room E, section of 9-Wall 4, southeastern side.




Fig. 45c. Room E, section of 9-Wall 4 on top of 12-Wall 9.

preserved at a height of 0.85 and has a width of 0.55-0.65. The top was found at 10.33 and the bottom at 9.53/9.44. The mortar was a mixture of red clay and red earth with bits of yellow clay, mud-bricks and looser brownish soil. The more clay-like mortar was found in the southeastern part of the wall while the face towards Room H had more loose soil.

The construction of this wall is unusual compared to most in that the part facing Room H consisted mainly of smaller and not very well laid stones (*Pl. 48b*) while the part facing Room E and where the door was (cf. below), was built of more regular stones in one row (*Pl. 46a*). The explanation is probably that the part facing Room H was not visible because the floor of Room H was at a c. 0.45 higher level than that of Room E, thus recalling the western part of the northern wall of Space I, 6-Wall 2 (see pp. 79-80). In the southwestern end of the wall there was originally an opening leading up to Room H via a large preserved slab stone and two or three conjectural steps (*Fig. 41, Pl. 45c*). East of the steps is the only place where the wall was regularly built in full width (cf. above). When the opening was filled in 0.25 of soil was laid above the lower step and above this the wall was built. The filled in doorway was not separately excavated.

Clay lining and plaster was found in all of the preserved length of 6-Wall 4 and on 0.95 of 6-Wall 3 (*Fig. 44, Pl. 45b-c*). The yellow clay lining was probably adhered to the walls in connection with the blocking up of the door (cf. above, p. 95) while it continued in use during the LM IIIB:2 phase of the room (*GSE* III, 34). The thickness of the yellow clay plaster varies from 0.01-05, while 0.04 seem to have been the normal. In places the clay lining went directly up to the stones, in other places there was a hard-packed, dark clay-like earth between the lining and stones. Below the clay lining traces of white plaster were noted which belonged to the phase of the original floor (*Pl. 45b*).

9-Walls 1-3. On the northeastern side of Room E four walls were found which may all have been connected to the room. This is certain for 9-Wall 1a (*Pl. 48d*), 9-Wall 3 and 9-Wall 2b, while 9-Wall 2a cannot be excluded even though it was for sure used for the constructions of Room P in the LM IIIB:2 period (see above p. 105). Some stones further north (*GSE* III, 34 and pl. 21c, top right) may have belonged to 9-Wall 1a which in full length would have measured 6.45.

9-Wall 1a (*Pl. 48c*). L 1.65. W *c*. 0.55. MpH 0.72 (top at level 10.23 to bottom at 9.55/9.50). The wall was destroyed in the northwestern end by a modern pit. The mortar was hard, clay-like, reddish soil. The southeastern end of this wall fragment seems to have been built slightly into the 9-Wall 3. Only the part facing Room E consisted of larger more regular stones of which some were probably reused ashlar blocks. No traces of clay lining and plaster was noted. A possible 0.07-10 "bedding" for the wall contained only MM and LM I.

9-Wall 2a. The wall is destroyed at the northwestern end by a modern pit. Pres. L 2.25; W c. 0.55; MpH c. 0.70. The top was at level c. 10.30 and the bottom at 9.64/9.60. The mortar is described as a mainly dark brown-greyish earth. It will be noted that the bottom of the wall was above the levels of both the LM IIIB:1 and IIIB:2 floors of Room E, which would seem to strengthen the idea that it was an LM IIIB:2 construction in connection with Space P. The wall appears to be of the typical sandwich type built mainly by rubble stones while a few had also been roughly cut (*Pl. 49a-b*).

9-Wall 2b. Completely preserved between 9-Wall 3 and 9-Wall 4. L 1.80; W c. 0.60. Neither top nor bottom of this wall was measured. Mortar described as brownish earth. The wall was preserved at places in two courses consisting of large dressed stones and the wall might have faced either way. No traces of clay lining were noted (*Pls. 49c-e*). The southeastern part was partly resting upon an LM IIIA:2 wall: 9-Wall 12 (*Pl. 49e*) and on 12-Wall 9 (*Figs. 42, 45c*).

9-Wall 3. L 2.10; W c. 0.60; Pres. H 0.75 (top at level 10.28 bottom at 9.53). It is uncertain whether or not this wall is completely preserved, since, to judge from the construction it seems to be a wall which had at some point in time continued towards the southwest (see *Pls. 46a, 48c-d and 49f*; see also *GSE* III, pl. 20a). It consisted of 2-3 courses of rubble and roughly dressed medium-sized stones with smaller stones as

fill, while one larger stone was sticking out into Room E (*Pl.* 49*e-f*). The mortar is described as the same red clay-like earth as found in 9-Wall 1a. No traces of clay lining were noted.

9-Wall 4 + 13-Wall 6 (*Pl. 50a-c*). L 3.60 + 0.80; Original L 5.60; W *c.* 0.70; MpH *c.* 1.15 (top at level 10.56, bottom at 9.43/9.39). *C.* 1.20 of the southwestern part of the wall is destroyed by a later pit, while in the northeastern part it is preserved up to seven causes (*Fig. 45a-b, Pl. 50a-b*). The wall is the usual sandwich type built by a few larger dressed stones but chiefly by medium-sized to smaller rubble stones. The mortar was a dark brown soil mixed with red-brownish clay and bits of charcoal. Around 526-524/705-706 the wall was resting upon 12-Wall 9, (see p. 108). Both sides of the wall we assume there was a door between Rooms E and U.

13-Wall 2a + 7-Wall 3 + Threshold + 6-Wall 3. L 1.20 + 1.30 + 1.20 + 2.30; Original L c. 8.70; W c. 0.60; MpH c. 0.76 (top at level 10.29, bottom at c. 9.53). Most of the wall, however, was only preserved in one course of stones. The northern part was destroyed by the Roman Ditch (GSE I, 205-208) while the southern part (*Pl. 51a*) was destroyed by a modern Greek Well, Well 3 (GSE I, 94-96). This southwestern wall of Room E is rather enigmatic. 13-Wall 2a meet 13-Wall 6 at an odd angle, but when prolonged it meet 7-Wall 3 and gives the south part of Room E a highly irregular shape. As aforementioned, the wall was, with one odd exception, only preserved in one course and it was built by medium-sized, mainly rubble stones. The most prominent part of the wall was a large threshold for the door between Room E and Space I (Pl. 51b). It measured 1.20×0.64 and was slightly rounded in the southern end. The threshold, which was c. 0.08 thick, had in its southeastern part a large, shallow pivot hole (Pl. 51a, c). From its position in the threshold it may be calculated that the width of the door would have been 0.70-0.80. For 6-Wall 3, see GSE III, 34-35.

Seemingly LM IIIA pottery was noted in all walls. In a few cases LM IIIB with "?". Several MM and LM I sherds. 17.060 kg of pottery were collected: 13% decorated, 71% kept and 0.3% inventoried. Shapes counted (1973+1974): 1 large stirrup jar, 3 undecorated kylikes, 1 undecorated jug, 1 undecorated cup, 2 undecorated bowls, 53 conical cups, 7 tripod cooking pot legs, 4 undecorated goblets, 2 decorated cups, 1 tripod storage jar leg and 4 footed cups.




Fig. 46. LM IIIB:1 Room U, plan of upper floor and distribution of finds.




Fig. 47. Room U, section A-A; cf. Figs. 46 and 48.

Comments: The joins are "natural". In several cases the soil underlying the aforementioned walls are included in the pottery described above. It may be noted that among the inventoried pottery none could be dated as pure LM IIIB:1, and we may have here another indication of late(?) LM IIIA:2 constructions.

ROOM U (Figs. 46-49, Pls. 17a:10-11, 21a:9-10, 51d-54a)

Room U seems to expose much the same history as Room E to the north. Three floor levels were noted. The latest floor was in use during LM IIIB:2 (cf. *GSE* III, 36-38), while the two lower ones were of the LM IIIB:1 date. The room is of irregular shape measuring $1.5(W)/3.0(E) \times 4.5$ which covers $c. 10 \text{ m}^2$. No doors to the room were preserved. One opening, however, probably opened into Room E (cf. above p. 103) and a door may have existed in the missing part of the east-

ern wall, 12-Wall 9. As was the case with Room E, no floor deposits of the IIIB:1 period existed and only constructions (floors and walls) of this room was excavated. Large parts of the room were destroyed by the Venetian wall, W1-015 (*GSE* I, 143-144), and later pits.

In upper floor (Figs. 46-47, Pl. 51d)

13-Floor 6 was preserved in the western part of the room and small fragments also in the southeastern and northern corners. The floor – stratified below the LM IIIB:2 floor – was only 0.02-4 thick, excavated at levels 9.71-9.65 down to 9.68-9.61 and in the southern part it sloped slightly towards the west. The lower, original floor of Room U, 13-Floor 7, was found immediately below and used as a floor bedding. The floor was light reddish-brown, rather hard and clayish with few stones.

The floor contained mainly LM IIIB, but also few pieces of LM IIIA, LM I and MM. 4.255 kg of pottery were collected (1974 and 1977): 14% decorated, 88% kept and 0.7% inventoried. Shapes counted (1971+1974): 1 decorated kylix, 1 undecorated goblet, decorated and undecorated cups and bowls, 1 tripod cooking pot leg, 1 tripod storage jar leg and 1 footed cup.




Fig. 48. LM IIIB:1 Room U, plan of lower floor, possible levelling deposit and distribution of finds.

In lower floor (Figs. 47-48, Pl. 52a)

13-Floor 7 was only identified in the western part of the room, where it was found everywhere below the upper floor. The floor was slightly uneven with surface noted on 9.62 and 9.68. The floor was 0.07-9 thick. It consisted of a reddish-brown, hard, clayish soil with some pebbles.

Apparently only LM III noted. 2.400 kg of pottery were collected: 21% decorated, 38% kept and 1.2% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.

Constructions

Possible levelling deposit below floors (Figs. 47-48, Pls. 17a:11, 21a:10)

This layer covers a larger area than the actual floors of Room U and also appears to have stretched north into Room E. Stratigraphically it is still within the LM IIIB period, as shown by the LM IIIA:2 pits found below. It was, in most places, a rather thin layer excavated at levels 9.56 down to 9.52. The soil is described as reddish-brown, rather soft, sandy with a few small stones and in the western part with pieces of charcoal.

According to preliminary dates the deposit contained LM IIIB and LM IIIA while LM I was also noted. 7.800 kg of pottery were collected: 20% decorated, 66% kept and 0.7% inventoried. Shapes were not counted.










Fig. 49c. Room U, section of 13-Wall 2, west part, northwestern side.

The walls (Figs. 48, 49a-c, Pls. 52b-c, 53a-b, 54a)

The southwestern wall, 13-Wall 4 (*Pl. 52b*), has been described in connection with the Corridor (above p. 80) and the northwestern wall, 13-Wall 6 + 9-Wall 4, has been described in connection with Room E (above p. 109). The two remaining walls were the fragmentary 12-Wall 9, and the almost complete southeastern wall, 13-Wall 2, only destroyed by the Venetian wall foundation from 525.3 to 526.2 (*GSE* I, 143-144).

13-Wall 2 (*Fig. 49a-c, Pls. 17a:7, 52c, 53a-b*) was the outer wall of Building 1 and had a narrow street on the south side. Apart from the above mentioned break the wall was preserved in its full length of c. 6.15 while the width of the wall

above floor level was c. 0.75. The wall was at its highest point – including the wall foundation – preserved to a height of 0.76. At the bottom there was obviously a foundation which was slightly broader than the standing part of the wall and which was laid with small stones. The upper part of the wall was built by mostly unworked stones of different sizes laid in dark reddish-brown, soft, mud mortar with small stones (and many pottery sherds cf. below). Unusual for walls of this period is the existence of a wall foundation, which however may have been because we are dealing with an outer wall.

12-Wall 9 (*Fig. 45c, Pl. 54a*) was obviously older than 9-Wall 4, being partly overbuilt by this and being (in the preserved part) of a different construction. 12-Wall 9 was preserved at a length of 2.1 and it continued towards northwest (*Fig. 45c*) below 9-Wall 2b (*Fig. 42*). The width of the wall was *c*. 0.65 and it was at the highest part (below 9-Wall 4) preserved to a height of 0.65. The wall was without foundation and built directly upon an earlier destruction level. It consisted of mainly uncut smaller stones, limestone and *psamiti* laid in a light brown, reddish-brown clay mortar mixed with charcoal bits.

Only three sherds came from 12-Wall 9 (77-P 0746, 1129 and 1130) and the fragment of a Handmade Burnished Ware (77-P 0981), it should be noted, came from a cleaning and need not have been part of the pottery from inside the walls. The contents of the walls were mainly of LM IIIA and LM IIIB date. One later sherd (Roman, not inventoried) was noted from an area where the Roman Ditch (*GSE* I, 205-208) had not been well enough cleaned. 19.550 kg of pottery were collected: 14% decorated, 59% kept and 1.4% inventoried.

Comments: All the joins seem to be "natural". The walls contained a considerable amount of pottery, almost 20 kg. Several of the registered sherds are of an LM IIIA date but 13-Wall 2 also contained a few LM IIIB:1 sherds. Thus an early LM IIIB date seems reasonable for this wall.
